Insanity is on the increase in the United States. This has been known by the alienists for severspirit and we guarantee that you al years. An investigation in New York state, Pennsylvania and Connecticut revealed this unpleasant truth It has been found that the number of insane in this country has increased to a marked degree in the last twenty years. In fact, the increase of insanity in this period has reached 97 per cent., while the increase in population in the same time is only 53 cf Berkstresser per cent. Various causes are assigned to this condition, which, if not checked, is likely to become a national menace. Some physicians say that 1mmigrants bring insanity into this country and are responsible for the increase in the number of insane. The immigration authorities refute this by stating that the immigration laws exclude the insane, and point to the number they deport. It is also stated that in the middle West, where theimmigrantis almost unknown, insanity is increasing.


