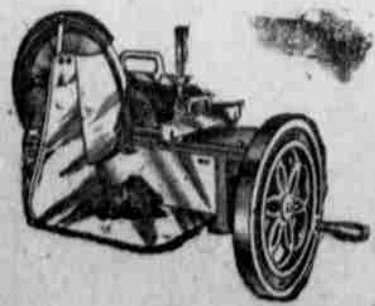

Early and Long Winter.

An early winter and a long and severe one is the gist of the first forecast of the season relative to the coming winter period. This forecast is quite a bit ahead of the goosebone prophets of Pennsylvania—was sent out from New York last Sunday. Trolley to St. Thomas.

At a trolley meeting held at St. Thomas much encouragement was given to the construction of a trolley from Chambersburg to St. Thomas, a distance of 7 1/2 miles.
