He had a crop of two hundred bushels of fine tubers, and he has already sold two loads of buckwheat flour and has more. He got 60 cents a bushel for a load of potatoes he took to Everett, and since that he has been getting 50 cents. He gets \$2.50 a hundred for buckwheat flour when he hauls it over the mountain, and when he sells it at home or in McConnellsburg, he gets \$2.40 for it. By the way he has fifteen bushels of prime clover seed to sell to somebody that needs it.

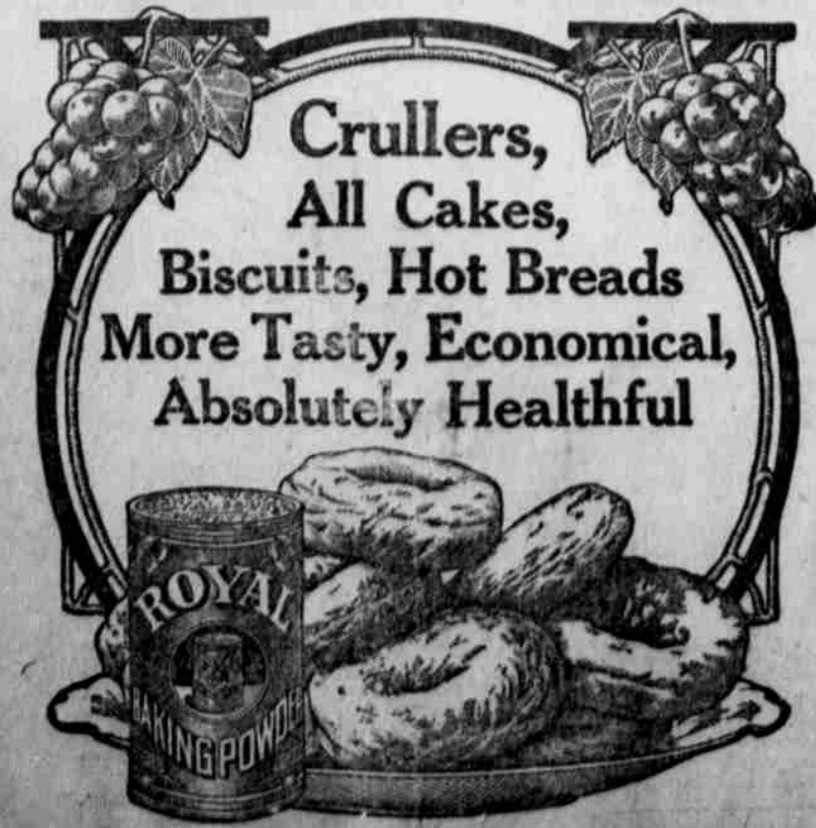
