

New York.-The plumage of fortythree specimens of birds formerly used to decorate women's hats cannot be sold by the milliners of New York state after July 1 next, according to the annual report of the National Association of Audubon Socie-

Weekly Review of Trade and Market Reports.

Bradstreets' Says: "Trade reports as a whole are nore uniformly favorable than for some time past. Distribution at retail has quite generally improved, largely because of colder weather and the realization of bumper corn and oats crops, though some parts of the Southwest and the South report that open weather has deterred improvement. However, the much better business done in retail lines has in turn resulted in a larger volume of jobbing re-orders, particularly for seasonable drygoods, boots and shoes and women's wearing apparel. At first bands quiet still continues in the textile trades, and, while the undercurrent is conservatively cheerful there is no anticipation of future business in larger volume." R. G. Dun & Co's Weekly Review

of Trade says 'in its bearing upon the future buying power of the country the most important development of the week is the official confirmation of the harvesting of the biggest corn crop on record, considerably over 3,000,000,-600 bushels being the unparalleled yield. The government report of cotton ginning is also helpful, indicating a crop well in excess of last year. The business outlook, however, is still doubtful and under conservative control, with the volume of transactions considerably below full capacity. The financial situation continues to maintain an ascendency over the commercial, and, while there is no substantial recession of the more hopeful sentiment recently established, financial conditions are not clearly defined."
