STATE CAPITAL NEWS

Paintings For The Capitol.

John W. Alexander, the artist, has agreed to enter into a contract to execute a series of mural paintings for the north corridor of the State Capitol building, illustrative of the industries of Pennsylvania, as originally contemplated in the decorative scheme for the State Capitol. The general appropriation bill approved last week carries an appropriation of \$22,000 for the purpose, and Samuel B. Rambo, State Superintendent of Public Grounds and Buildings, has received word from Mr. John W. Alexander that he is willing to carry out the commission. Mr. Alexander had planned to paint the series before the Capitol was completed, but the halting of all work not begun in the days when the cost of the finishing of the interior of the building was mounting beyond reasonable figures caused abandonment. William Van Inghen, the Philadela painter, had completed his deccration of the south corridor before the order went into effect. The Van Inghen paintings illustrate the religious sects which figured in the colonization of Pennsylvania. The Alexander paintings will be a companion series and show the industries which made the Keystone State great, including agricultural, from and steel making, oil development, coal mining and lines of manufac-

Fight Pests With Water.

Superintendent Rambo, of the State Public Grounds and Buildings, has taken to fighting the caterpillar pests, which are damaging some of the Capitol Park trees, with a fire hose. The force of gardeners has been working over time to keep down the pests and it was found that knocking down the insects was taking up too much time. Today the plan of using a fire hose was adopted. A strong plug stream was turned on the lindens and other trees and the caterpillars were brought down by the thousand and speedily destroyed.

To-Test Milk.

City health officers have taken up the subject of milk inspection on their own initiative in addition to the supervision exercised by the State Dairy and Food Commission's agents, and complete inspection of all dairies and wagons will be made. Samples of milk will be secured to see if they are within the provisions of the new milk standard act.

Meehan To Aid Shad.

State Fish Commissioner William E. Mechan issued a statement that the difficulty with the fishways at the McCall's Ferry Dam on the Susquehanna, is that too much water flows through them and the fish are unable to get up because of the force of the stream. He also stated that steps were to be taken to establish a system of pools on the York county side to facilitate shad getting up the river. Shad were found to have reached pools in rocks within ten feet of the top of the dam.



Playgrounds, gardens, lawns will be laid out on the five-acre tract. Rest for Tuberculosis Patients.

Dr. Joseph H. Pratt of Boston, who was the founder of the first tuberculosis class in the United States in the Emmanuel church in Boston claims that in the treatment of tuberculosis absolute rest, often in bed, must be extended over a period of months, before the consumptive should take any exercise. He says: "Prolonged rest in bed out of doors yields better results than any other method of treating pulmonary tuberculosis. Patients will have a better appetite, and take more food without discomfort and gain weight and strength faster than patients with active disease who are allowed to exercise. Complications are much less frequent. When used in the incipient stage recovery is more rapid and surer."
