



The Medical Society of Pennsylvania ended its sixty-first annual meeting at the State Capitol, after Dr. James Tyson, of Philadelphia, the newly-elected president of the organization, had taken his place as the chairman. The society selected Scranton as its place of meeting in 1912, indorsed the work of Dr. Harvey W. Wiley as an enforcer of the pure food laws, and enlisted itself in the cam paign to stamp out disease growing out of the social evil.

The closing session was marked by half a dozen papers on such vital subjects as the care of the insane and cancer, one of the exhibits in the latter series being a moving picture show a stomach demonstrating the methods of assimilation.

One of the most notable papers of the meeting was by Dr. Chevalier Jackson, of Pittsburg, who described the manner in which a tack had been removed from the lung of a young woman who was suffering from tubery culosis. The tack was swallowed eleven years ago. The woman who was thought to be dving is rapidly improving in health.

Before the eye and ear section of the society, Dr. William Blair, of Pittsburgh, aroused general and complimentary discussion by a paper on preventable blindness. Dr. Blair declared that forty thousand persons in the United States were needlessly blind and that one-third of the cases were due to carelessness.

The work of the welfare department of the Carnegle Steel Company, at Fittsburgh, was given high praise by the speaker. He referred to the inclosure of emery wheels with glass, and the use of wicker work spectacles, and said that as a result of such preventive measures the number of eye accidents in an army of 34,000 men had been reduced to a minimum, hardly thought possible a few years 8.80. "What one concern has thought it possible to work out on a practical basis toward such a distinctly humanitarian end, I feel that the State should take as a starting point for legislation to the end that the adoption of similarly effective devices shall become mandatory in all branches of labor '

Several of the speakers referred to the new school code's provisions for medical inspection as steps in the right direction.


