The munificent sum of \$160,000 will be distributed in dividends among the stockholders of the Geiser Company, Waynesboro, after January 1. The volume of business for the past year was about \$2,500,000. Next year it is hoped to increase this by \$1,000,000; the shops will also be enlarged.

The greatest cotton crop on record, 14,885,000 bales, is the department of agriculture's official estimate of the country's total production this year. This is greater by 1,447,000 bales than the record crop of 1904. Every State in the cotton belt, except Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas and Oklahoma, established new records for production.

The Pennsylvania Railroad company is asking an injunction to prevent dynamiting on the state road in the Narrows, near Lewis town. It is stated that train crews and passengers have their lives endangered and that people living near the road are likely to be victims of falling debris. Valuable property is also endangered.

Murder Near Hagerstown.

Hagerstown, Dec. 18.—John Elmer Scadden was shot and instantly killed by William Cross yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock. From what could be learned the shoot which happened at Black Rock, near Beaver Creek, is held by witnesses to be a deliberate murder. Young Scadden who is only twenty-one had been with James Marsh and William Cross and the three had been shooting mark with a revolver. The three had been at Cross' home and been drinking wine and all were under the influence of liquor. The father of the dead man said he saw Cross pull the gun from his hip pocket and fire while the dead man's sister testified she heard Cross say if he (Scadden) did not get out of the way he (Cross) would move him. It is assumed from this statement that Cross either wanted to shoot at the mark or else he was so drunk he did not know what he was doing. The bullet which was a thirty-two entered Scadden's head at the back of the neck and taking an upward course lodged under the right eye.

Cross was arrested and placed in jail here, after an inquest was called. Cross is about 40, married and has a daughter aged 6 years.

Less Than Five Minutes.

The world's record for plowing was recently broken in a demonstration at Purdue University, Indiana, in which a gang plow having 50 plows and drawn by three traction engines turned over a stubble field at the rate of an acre every 4 1/2 minutes, says the January Popular Mechanics Magazine in an illustrated article. This mammoth plow cuts a strip nearly 60 ft. wide, and turns over 7 acres for every mile it travels. Each of the 50 plows is independent of the others, rising and falling as easily and naturally as a wooden chip on the surface of rough water, so that the service of the machine is not confined to ground absolutely level.

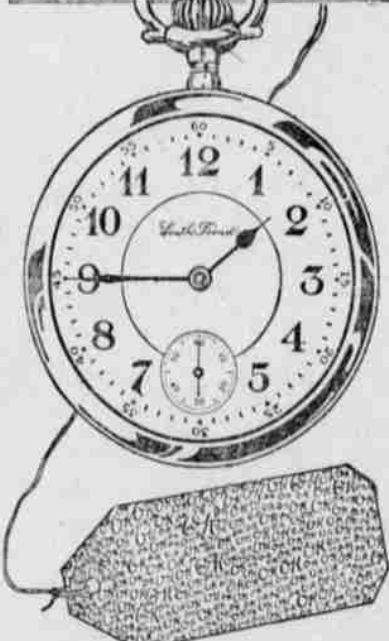
