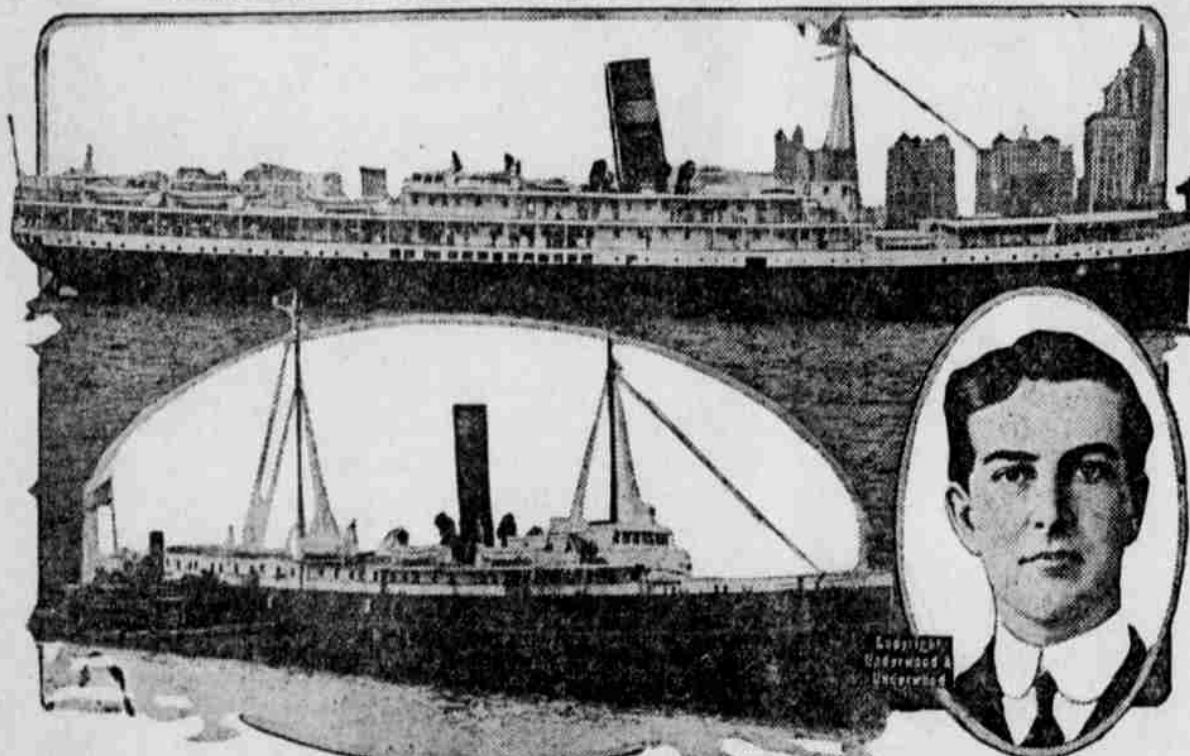

## TRAGEDY OF THE SEA AND ONE OF THE HEROES



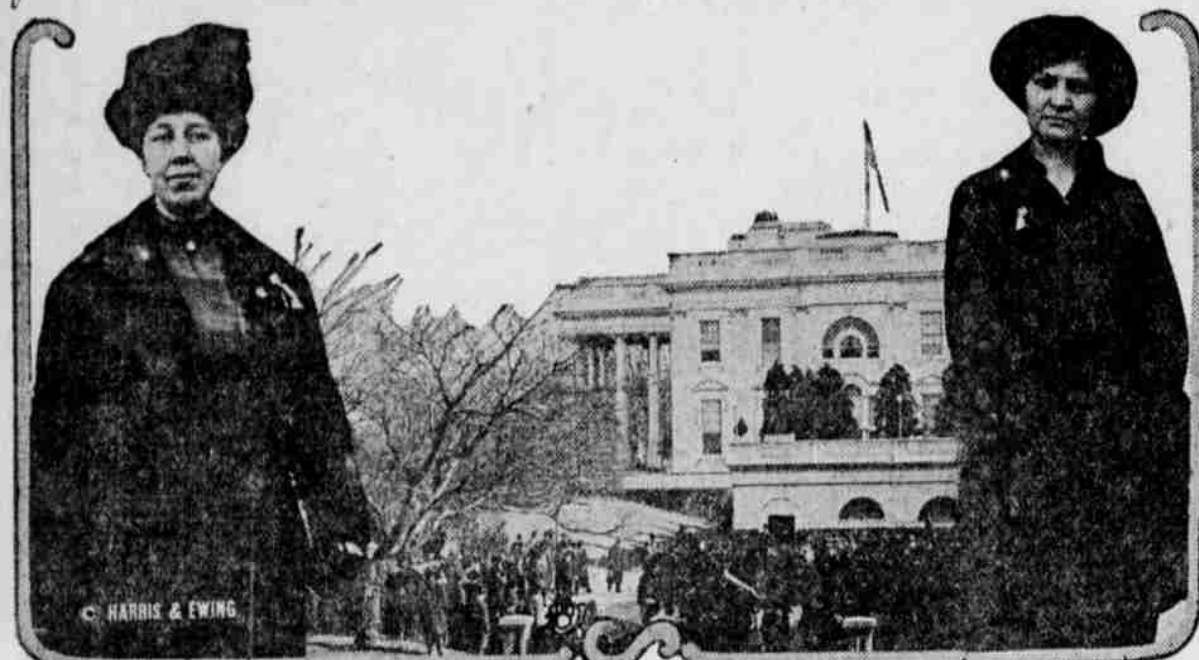
