The orchards will be used for public demonstration purposes by the State and the owner will receive the benefit in the way of special instructions in the management of the orchards. It is estimated that 819 cows furnishing milk to consumers in Hagerstown have been tested with tuberculin. Of these cows 53 were found to have had tuberculosis. Thirty of the diseased cows were slaughtered. Of those slaughtered 12 were passed as fit for food; 18 as unfit for food. The balance have been shipped out of the country or placed in quarantine to be disposed of by the state live stock sanitary board.

The First Cattle Feeders' Convention ever held in Pennsylvania will occur at State College, April 3, 1914. Sixty head of West Virginia cattle were fed there this year. They were fed in five separate lots, and it is said that results are of great interest to feeders. The herd will be judged on that day by experts for the benefit of visitors. The trip will pay to take if you are interested in the economical feeding of beef cattle.
