Moths and Lice.

It is claimed that the strong scent of red cedar will keep moth from clothes, and lice from the roosts of poultry. This being the case, it would seem that the free use of red cedar, shavings, or sawdust, would be greatly preferred to that of the moth ball which leaves such a sickening odor on woolens and furs.

For poultry roosts, it is recommended that the roost poles be made of cedar, and that as much of this wood as possible be used in hen houses at places where lice harbor. An ample supply of cedar sawdust could be had by hacking a piece of the wood with a saw until the desired amount is procured, to be sprinkled freely among woolens and furs when they are packed away for the summer months.
