**Shall We Irrigate.**

The costly drought of the summer just passed brings up the question "Shall eastern farmers irrigate?" We say yes, if you have a piece of land that is level enough so that it will not "wash." At the present time there are hundreds of farms in Texas that are irrigated by water pumped from deep wells. Springs and small flowing streams are the exception in Texas, and irrigation in that State is rather expensive—at first thought—but nothing is too expensive if it pays large returns. A few years ago a few men tried it there, and it paid so well that, in many parts of that state, a farm without a private irrigation plant is the exception. Here in Fulton county, we have springs and streams, and plenty of roof surface from which to catch thousands of barrels of fine water to be stored in cement reservoirs. We feel very sure that if some one would set the example, others would soon follow, and, in many places, five acres of irrigated land would produce more than twenty acres yield without irrigation. In addition, the cost of ploughing, seeding, cultivating and cutting the other fifteen acres would be eliminated. Many farmers already have the gasoline engine, or the windmill, to pump the water.
