Every person excepting Justice of the Peace who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States or of this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is, or shall be, employed under the legislative, executive or judiciary department of this State or of the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated State, he shall be incapable of holding or exercising, at the same time, the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector or Clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and no Inspector, Judge, or other officer of any such election, shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for, except that of an election officer.

QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS. Every male citizen twenty-one years of age possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections: First, he shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month. Second, he shall have resided in the State one year (or if, having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State, he shall have resided therefrom and returned, within six months) immediately preceding the election. Third, he shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election. Fourth, if twenty-two years of age or upward, he shall have paid within two years a State or County tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election--State Constitution, Article VIII, Section 1.
