Any person who shall malicousthe illness and death of her broth- from us. Every practical farm- ly kill, maim, or disfigure any domestic animal, or administer poison to it, is liable to a fine of five hundred dollars and three years imprisonment by separate or solitary confinement at labor.

> It shall be unlawful for any owner to offer for sale, or sell any horse which by reason of debility, disease or lameness, or for other cause could not be worked in this Commonwealth, without violating the laws against cruelty to animals.
