It Only Took About an Hour to Dispose of all the Business.

The June Court called at 10 a. m. Tuesday, with Hon. S. McC. Swope, Pres. Judge, and his Associates Hon. W. B. Stigers and Wm. Mellott on the bench.

The petition of Myrtle McDonald administratrix of John J. McDonald, late of Licking Creek township deceased was presented praying for an order to sell real estate for payment of debts. Order awarded upon giving bond in the sum of \$5,000.

Widows appraisal in the estate of John J. McDonald, was approved and ordered to be recorded unless exceptions be filed within 20 days.

In the case of Eva B. Bard, vs. Erastus Bard, proceedings in divorce, Hon. S. W. Kirk, was appointed Master.

Widows appraisal in the estate of Harry Plessinger late of Belfast township deceased, was approved and ordered to be recorded unless exceptions are filed within 20 days.

Return of Viewers appointed by the Court to view a site for a county bridge at Gladfelter's fording in Taylor township was confirmed.

The return of sale of real estate, of B. A. Deavor late of Taylor township deceased, was confirmed.

In the case of D. J. Truax, vs. Anna Truax, Libel in Divorce, a subpoena was awarded by the Court.

That Egg Receipt.

To preserve eggs, use a pint of slacked lime, half a pint of coarse salt, mixed with three gallons of water.

Slack some lime under water and do not use until cold. Then use but a pint of the slacked lime. As published last, some may have understood that more lime was necessary, namely, all the slacked lime that a pint of stone lime would make. This would be too much.
