PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION SUB-MITTED TO THE CITIZENS OF THE COMMONWEALTH FOR THEIR APPROVAL OR REJECTION, BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF FENNSYL VANIA, AND PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH, IN PURSU-ANCE OF ARTICLE XVIII OF THE CONSTITUTION.

Number Two. A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to section eight of article nine of the Constitution of Pennsylvania. Section. 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the Com-monwealth of Penusylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the eighteenth article thereof :---Amend section eight, article nine of

the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, which reads as fol-10%8:

"Section 8. The debt of any county, city, borough, township, school district, or other municipality or incorporated district, except as herein pro vided, shall never exceed seven pet centum upon the assessed value of the taxable property therein, nor shall any such municipality or district in cur any new debt, or increase its in debtedness to an amount exceeding two per centum upon such assessed val uation of property, without the asseni of the electors thereof at a public elecon in such manner as shall be vided by law; but any city, the debt of which now exceeds seven per centum of such assessed valuation may be authorized by law to increase the same three per centum. In the ag gregate, at any one time, upon such valuation, except that any debt of debts hereinafter incurred by the city and county of Philadelphia for the construction and development of sub ways for transit purposes, or for the construction of wharves and docks, or the reclamation of land to be used in the construction of a system of wharves and docks, as public improve ments, owned or to be owned by said eity and county of Philadelphia, and which shall yield to the eity and county of Philadelphia current nel revenues in excess of the interest on said debt or debts, and the annual stallments necessary for the cancella-tion of said debt or debts. May be excluded in ascertaining the power of the city and county of Philadelphia to become otherwise indebted: Provid by established and maintained," so that it shall read as

Section 8. The debt of any county, trict, or other municipality or incorporated district, except as herein pro-vided, shall never exceed seven per centum upon the assessed value of the taxable property therein, nor shall any such municipality or district incur any new debt, or increase its in debtedness to an amount exceeding two per centum upon such assessment valuation of property, without the consent of the electors thereof at a public election in such manner a shall be provided by law; but any city, the debt of which on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, exceeded seven per centum of such assessed valuation, and has not since been re duced to loss than such per centum, may be authorized by law to increase the same three per centum in the ag gregate, at any one time, upon such raiustion. The city of Philadelphia, of such system, judicial powers, with
