Deer hunters busy, but with little success.

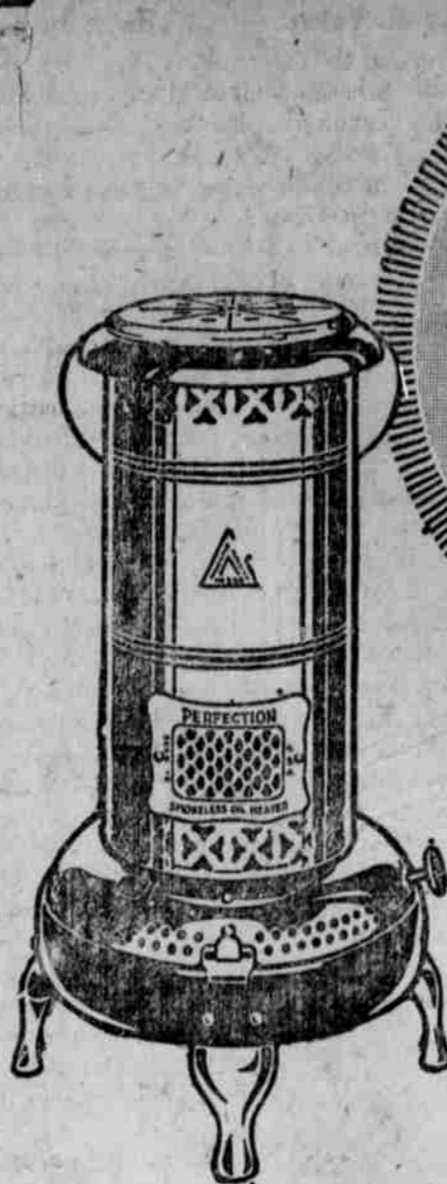
Mrs. E. A. Hixson is very ill. A Johnstown man cut and shipped a carload of Christmas trees from this section to his city last week.
