State Agricultural Notes.

Reports from crop correspone-Lottie Bradnick, Ethel Martz, ents of the Department of Agri-Ruth Campbell, Ada Cunningham, culture show that the condition of Emma Bradnick, Lucile, Huldah the wheat in the south western and Vera Shadle; Irene, Bessie counties is the best in the State. and Alma Aller; Park and John Washington, Westmoreland and Foster, Russel and Richard Martz, Somerset counties report wheat Norman Helman, John and Lewis above normal condition and Fay-Cunningham, Kessler Cooper, ette county wheat is above the Frank, Paul, Clarence and Ivan average. The Greene and Bed-Hamil, Brice Aller and Frank ford county wheat is only slightly below average.

How many bushels of corn must you raise on your land in order to pay six per cent, on the money you have invested? Experts have answered this question as follows: A yield of 36 bushels to an acre on \$50 land: 42 bushels per acre on \$100 land; 60 bushels per acre on \$350 land and 72 bushels per acre on land valued at \$375 per acre.

The counties in which commercial fertilizers are used most extensively in Pennsylvonia are; Carbon, Chester, Columbia, Delaware, Franklin, Lehigh, Northampton, Philadelphia, and York.

Statistics of the Department of Agriculture show that there are fifty per cent, less farmers in the State fattening steers for spring market than a year ago. Only five per cent, of the farmers of the State are feeding for the spring market.

Westmoreland county ranks first in the number of pure bred stallions in the State and Tioga county has the largest number of pure bred bulls.

Statistics of the Department of Agriculture show seventyeight per cent, of the farmers of the State using commercial fertilizers. This is a ten per cent decrease over a year ago and is probably due to the increasd cost of fertilizers, lack of potash, home mixing and an increased use of lime.


