# Samuel G. Dixon, M. D., LL. D., Commissioner of Health.

A word to the fond mother about the danger of handling books in the home from circulating libraries where the organization is such that it does not require books to be disinfected every time they are returned from circulation.

With all the care and energy of the health authorities, thousands of homes in this State are infected with tuberculosis and it will continue to be spread all through circulating libraries unless the people demand the disinfection of the books to destroy the germs of disease that they may carry from home to home. We often see a mother with

her infant in her arms that is being lulled to sleep while the moth er is reading a book from a circulating library.

Tuberculosis is only one of several diseases that may be communicated by unclean books.
