Good Words For Harris.

The following clipped from exchanges show what is thought of Geo. A. Harris as candidate for Congress in other parts of the District.

From Lewisburg, (Union County) Journal. The official returns of the primaries reveal something of the standing of the respective Congressional candidates in their own communities, which is food for some reflection. Dick Williamson carried his home town Huntingdon by a majority of 373 and his county by over 850 against Foelt. Take the result of Union, Foelt own county, and there are figures to tell another tale. Lewistown South Ward, the candidate's own district, gave him 40 votes and Williamson 29.

From Perry County Democrat. The large majority Mr. Geo. A. Harris received in his home county (Fulton) and in Franklin, the home of his opponent for the nomination, speaks louder than words as to his popularity and the high regard in which he is held by those who know him best, and is in striking contrast to the pitiable small vote which Foelt, the Republican candidate, received in his home county (Union).

The large vote cast for Richard W. Williamson, Esq., in the district is very significant. It indicates that Foelt is on the political toboggan. Hundreds of Republicans cannot vote for Foelt, knowing him and his business transactions too well, some of them to their sorrow. From a Democratic standpoint the situation looks good and the election of Mr. Harris is confidently predicted. Adv.

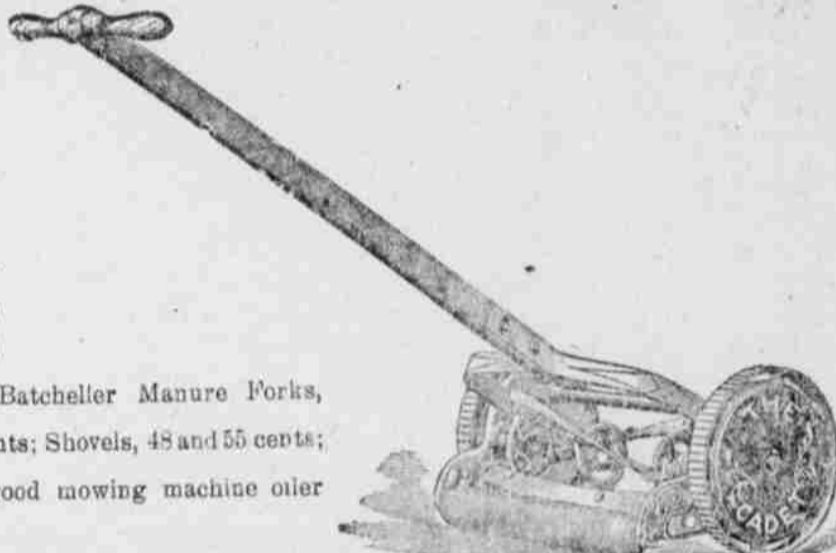

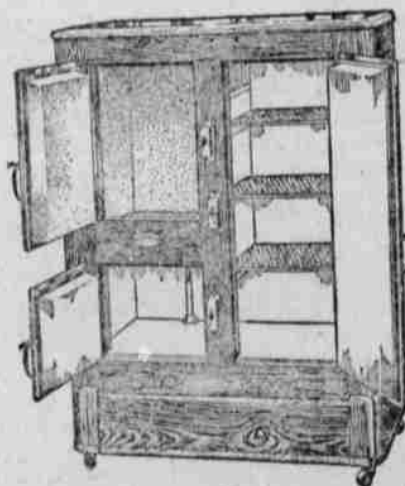
