**To Fix Window Shades.**

When the ordinary spring roller shade will not work, try this plan. Take the shade off the brackets unroll it full length and roll it up by hand, place it back on the brackets and pull the shade down and then let it roll back as far as it will on its spring. Keep it in place at which it stopped, take it down again unroll it full length and roll it up completely by hand. Repeat this process until the spring has been wound up to the desired tension.

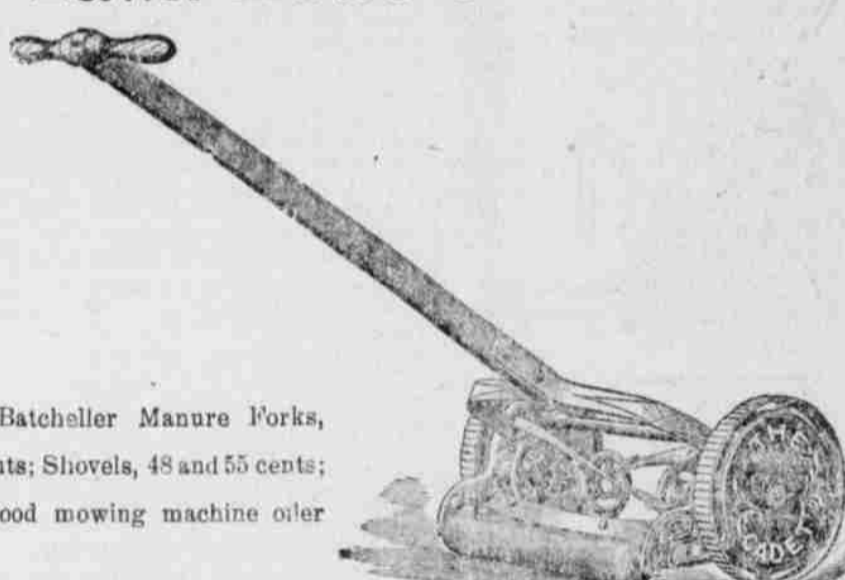

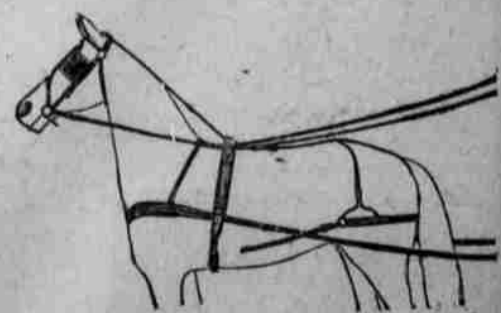
