Proposing an amendment to article IX of the Constitution of Pennsyl-

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby, proposed, in accord-ance with the XVIII article thereof.— Section 16. The State, or any mu-nicipality thereof, acquiring or appropriating property or rights over or in property for public use, may, in fur-therance of its plans for the acquisition and public use of such property or rights, and subject to such restrictions as the Legislature may from time to time impose, appropriate an excess of property over that actually to be occupied or used for public use, and may thereafter sell or lease such excess, and impose on the property so sold or leased any restrictions ap propriate to preserve or enhance the benefit to the public of the property actually occupied or used.

Number Two. A JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing an amendment to the Con stitution of the Commonwealth of

the courts of common pleas of Philadelphia County. Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania be, and the

same is hereby, proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:-That section six of article five be amended so as to read as follows: Section 6. In the county of Phila-delphia all the jurisdiction and powers now vested in the several num-bered courts of common pleas of that county shall be vested in one court of common pleas, composed of all the judges in commission in said courts. Such jurisdiction and powers shall extend to all proceedings at law and in equity which shall have been instituted in the several numbered courts, and shall be subject to such change as may be made by law and subject to change of venue as provided by law. The president judge of the said court shall be selected as provided by law. The number of judges in said court may be by law increased from time to time. amendment shall take effect on the first day of January succeeding its

In the county of Allegheny all the jurisdiction and powers now vested in the several numbered courts of common pleas shall be vested in one court of common pleas, composed of all the judges in commission in said courts. Such jurisdiction and powers shall extend to all proceedings at law and in equity which shall have been instituted in the several numbered courts, and shall be subject to such change as may be made by law, and subject to change of young as providsubject to change of venue as provided by law. Proposing an amendment to article nine, section four of the Constitution of the Commonwealth Pennsylvania; authorizing State to issue bonds to State to issue bonds to the amount of fifty millions of dollars for the improvement of the highways of the Commonwealth.
Section 1. Be it resolved by the
Senate and House of Representa-Senate and House state tives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met That the following amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania ba, and the same is hereby, proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth ar-

ticle thereof:—
That section four of article nine That section four of article nine which reads as follows:

"Section 4. No debt shall be created by or on behalf of the State, except to supply casual deficiencies of revenue, repel invasions, suppress insurrection, defend the State is war, or to pay existing debt; and the debt created to supply deficiency in revenue shall never exceed in the aggregate, at any one time, one million dollars," be amended so as to read as follows:

Section 4. No debt shall be created.

Section 4. No debt shall be created by or on behalf of the State except to supply casual deficiencies of revenue, repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the State it war, or to pay existing debt; and the debt created to supply deficien-cies in revenue shall never exceed in the aggregate, at any one time one million dollars: Provided, how-ever, That the General Assembly, in respective of any debt, may authorize the State to issue bonds to the amount of fifty millions of dollars for the purpose of improving and rebuilding the highways of the Commonwealth.

Section 2. Said proposed amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State, at the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November in the year nineteen hundred and eighteen, for the purpose of deciding upon the approval and ratification or the rejection of said amendment. Said election shall be opened, held, and closed upon said election day, at the places and within the hours at and within which said election is directed to be opened, held, and closed, and in accordance with the provi-sions of the laws of Pennsylvania governing elections, and amend-ments thereto. Such amendment shall be printed upon the ballots in the form and manner prescribed by the election laws of Pennsylvania, and shall in all respects conform to the requirement of such laws.

Proposing an amendment to section eight, article nine of the Constitution of Pennsylvania. Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-tives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the Con-stitution of the Commonwealth o, Pennsylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the eighteenth article

Amendment to Article Nine, Section Eight.
That section eight of article nine of the Constitution be amended by

striking out the said section and inserting in place thereof the follow-Section 8. The debt of any coundistrict, or other municipality or incorporated district, except as provided herein, and in section fifteen of this article, shall never exceed seven (7) per centum upon the as-sessed value of the taxable property therein, but the debt of the city o' Philadelphia may be increased in such amount that the total city deb of said city shall not exceed ten per centum (10) upon the assessed value of the taxable property there in, nor shall any such municipality or district incur any new debt, or increase its indebtedness to an amount exceeding two (2) per cent-um upon such assessed valuation of property, without the consent of the electors thereof at a public election in such manner as shall be provided by law. In ascertaining the borrowing capacity of the said city of Philadelphia, at any time, there shall be excluded from the calcula-tion and deducted from such debt so much of the debt of said city as shall have been incurred, and the proceeds thereof invested, in any Pennsylvania so as to consolidate

public improvements of any character which shall be yielding to the said city an annual current net revenue. The amount of such deduction shall be ascertained by cap italizing the annual net revenue from such improvement during the year immediately preceding the time of such ascertainment; and such capitalization shall be estimated by ascertaining the principal amount which would yield such annual, current net revenue, at the average rate of interest, and sinking-fund charges payable upon the indebtedness incurred by said city for such purposes, up to the time of such ascer-tainment. The method of determining such amount, so to be deducted, may be prescribed by the General Assembly. In incurring indebtedness for any purpose the city of Philadelphia may issue its obliga-tions maturing not later than fifty (50) years from the date thereof, with provision for a sinking-fund sufficient to retire said obligations at maturity, the payment to such sfuking-fund to be in equal or graded annual or other periodical instal-ments. Where any indebtedness shall be or shall have been incurred by said city of Philadelphia for the purpose of the construction or im-provement of public works of any character from which income or rev-enue is to be derived by said city. or for the reclamation of land to be used in the construction of wharves or docks owned or to be owned by said city, such obligations may be in an amount sufficient to provide for, and may include the amount of the and may include the amount of, the interest and sinking-fund charges accruing and which may accrue thereon throughout the period of construction, and until the expiration of one year after the completion of the work for which said indebtedness shall have been incurred; and said city shall not be required to levy a tax to pay said interest and sinking-fund charges as required by section ten, article nine, of the Constitution of Pennsylvania, until the expiration of said period of one year after the completion of said work.
