HOW TO MARK A BALLOT. To vote a straight party ticket, mark a cross (X) in the square, in the First Column, opposite the name of

head of a group of Presidential Electors, opposite name of a party and its Presidential Candidates, is a vote for all electors of that party, but for no other candidates. A cross mark in the square opposite

A cross mark in the square at the

the name of any candidate indicates a vote for the candidate. If you desire to vote for a person whose name is not on the ballot, write or paste his name in the blank space provided for that purpose. A cross (X) in the party square in the

first column does not carry a vote: for any Judge. To vote for judge mark a cross (X) opposite the name of the candidate desired.

QUALIFICATION OF BOARD.

Every person excepting Justice of the Poace who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States or of this Since, or of any elly or incorporated district, whether a commission ed officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is, or shall be, employed under the legislative executive or judiciary department of this State or of the United States, or of any eity or incorporated district, and also that every of this State or of the Univel States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select or common control of any city, or coambisoloners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising, at the same time, the office or appointment of Judge, inspector or Clerk of any election of this Common wealth; and no Inspector Judge, or other officer of any such election, shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for, except that of an election officer.

Every male citizen twenty-one years of age possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections: First he shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month. Second, he shall have resided in the State one year (or if, having previously been a qualified elector or native born exigns of the State, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, within six months) immediately preceding the election. Third, He shall have resided in the election. Third, He shall have resided in the election district where he shall after to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election. Fourth, if Iwenty-two years of age or nywards he shall have point within two years a State or County tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election. State Constitution, Article VIII, Section, 1.
