Eat More Corn.

Ordinarily the quantity of corn produced in the United States is from three to four times the quantity of wheat, but only a very small portion of the crop-from 5 to 10 per cent-has been used for human food. This amount may be estimated in normal times at about 200,000,000 bushels year. Not over 5 per cent has been exported in peace times. A relatively slight increase in the corn acerage, therefore, will place many millions of bushels more of human food at the disp sal of the world without interfering in any way with the feed




