McKean Stevens was born at Clear Ridge, this county October 10, 1877, and he died at Harrisburg, Pa., June 19, 1917.

Mr. Stevens moved his family to North Madison, Ind., in 1882 where Curtis graduated from the High School, He also attended Moores' College and was graduated from the University of Louisville, Ky. In March 1904 he went to Harrisburg into the office of his cousin, Dr. John C. Stevens where he remained three and one half years as his assistant. 
