

TEXT-And they that be teachers (mar-gin) shall shine as the brightness of the irmament.-Daniel 12:3,

According to ancient fable, Jupiter once offered the prize of immortality



warrior boasted of his patriotism, the rich man of his munificence, the orator boasted of his voice, the poet spoke of his power to move even the gods by praise. Seeing a venerable man looking upon the group of

competitors but presenting no claim, Jupiter exclaimed, "Who art thou?" "Only a spectator," said the sage; "all these were once my pupils." "Crown him, crown him," said Jupiter; "crown the faithful teacher with immortality."

Making due allowance for the extravagance of this fable, there yet remains enough of truth in it to prove an inspiration to every faithful teacher. God has indeed laid upon you a great responsibility. As a teacher and companion of youth you have an influence second to no other in the community. You are in daily contact with minds that are bright, hearts that are sensitive, and wills that are pliable. They are sent to you for the express purpose of being influenced by you, and at the most plastic period of their lives.

Granted that the special work for which you are employed is to educate the mind; still, is it not your duty also to lead them into the realms of spiritual knowledge, and above all to introduce them to the Great Teacher, who said, "Take my yoke upon you and learn of me, and ye shall find rest unto your souls?"

We all know that young people do not wish to have religion thrust upon them continually, but they do, without exception, admire a strong Christian character, and they appreciate a loving Christian interest in their welfare and an occasional carnest word upon the subject.

Remember also that many of your pupils receive no Christian training at home, and they will doubtless go out into the world without any definite religious principles unless they receive them from you.

Of all the instructors whom the writer had in school and college, no one did so much in shaping his life as the district schoolteacher who introduced him to Jesus Christ. And there was seldom a term in that school when someone was not laid under the same debt of gratitude. There was no distinctive religious teaching in the school, but in and out of classroom she so exhibited the beauty of holiness in her own life that her pupils became easy converts to her Lord and Master when the opportunity arrived to pre-

sent his claims. Every true teacher hopes to leave the stamp of his own personality upon those entrusted to his care. Blessed is he whose personal impress leaves on every heart the beautiful image of Jesus.

If you are a Sunday school teacher your opportunities are all the greater for leading your scholars to Christ. No one can estimate the influence of a real heart-to-heart talk with a pupil, or the touch of a loving hand, or the power of persistent prayer, but those who use these means know that they are almost irresistible.

50 and 60 of her scholars. But when we live a divided life, when we call Christ, "Master," with our lips and crucify him again and again upon the cross of our own convenience, we may as well take a vacation until we decide, once and forever, whose we are, and whom we are to

NORTH DAKOTA'S CONSERVATION POLICY.

From an article in the Union Signal by Mrs. Elizabeth Preston Anderson, president North Dakota W. C. T. U., we quote the following paragraphs: "While North Dakota is an agricultural and not a manufacturing state, yet according to the United States census for 1910 the average number of wage-earners increased in ten years 105 per cent. The value of goods produced increased in the same time 205 per cent. The value of farm products increased during the same decade 211 per cent; the value of live stock 155 per cent; the value of crops 234 per cent. This percentage of increase was not exceeded by any other state in the Union. During the year 1913 this state led every state in railroad construc-

"The tax on \$1,000 of actual value in 1913 was 90 cents. The same year In Minnesota the tax on \$1,000 of actual value was \$2.12; Montana, \$1.20; Idaho, \$1.61; Iowa, \$2.45; Nebraska, \$1.25; Michigan, \$2.5; Indiana, \$4.00."

. . .

"The agricultural wealth of North Dakota exceeds the agricultural wealth of the six New England states combined, and, with the exception of Texas, exceeds in value any of the 16 Southern states, all of which, except Delaware and Florida, have more than three times North Dakota's population. The total wealth of the state incrensed from \$337,006,506 in 1890 to \$1,973,616,540 in 1917. Under prohibition the state has multiplied its wealth nearly six times," . . .

"North Dakota has a bank for every 767 inhabitants. In 15 years, from 1898 to 1913, the bank deposits increased more than 1,000 per cent. No state in the Union exceeded this percentage of increase. The per capita bank deposit in 1913 was \$138. In 1917, according to figures compiled by the state commissioner of agriculture and labor, it was \$235.95. Has any license state nearly doubled its per capita bank deposit in four years? The per capita wealth in 1917 was \$2,891. Eighty per cent of the people of the state own their homes."

"North Dakota has the largest number of consolidated schools of any state in the Union. These give the children in rural districts the advantage of grade and high schools. An amount exceeding \$5,000,000 is expended on the common schools of the state every year. The state has a perpetual endowment fund for schools and institutions of \$64,000,000. North Dakota boasts the lowest juvenile delingency rate of any state."

WHY HE IS FOR PROHIBITION.

Judge Henry, for 15 years judge of the district court of Polk county, Iowa, speaking concerning his attitude on

"In the discharge of my duty I was compelled to send my playmates of childhood days to penitentiaries, inebriate asylums and to the jails as a consequence of saloons in Des Moines, During my 15 years on the bench, I spent four years in the criminal division. I sent more than a thousand men to penitentiaries and Jails for criminal offenses committed by them, and I know that 90 per cent of these crimes were caused by drunkenness originat-

ing in saloons. "I granted more than 1,000 divorces, and I know that 90 per cent of them were the consequence of drunkenness and the drunkenness was due to the saloon. I have taken thousands of children and placed them in state institutions for public protection and education whose homes were ruined by drunkenness. I have seen and know the moral depravity, the poverty, disgrace, the ruined hopes of mothers and children, the insane asylums and poorhouses crowded until the accumulated curses that I have seen springing from the presence of the saloon condemn that institution as the vilest influence that infests this world today."

LIQUOR DRINKING UNPATRIOTIC.

The American Lumberman well puts it thus: "No longer is the appeal for total

abstinence based upon emotional or even upon moral grounds. Drinking simply does not fit in with modern standards of efficiency, and the industrial world is the most bitter opponent that the liquor interests confront today. Since the United States entered into the war, the conviction also has grown that in view of the necessity for food conservation, as well as for the highest measure of production in all lines, indulgence in booze takes on an unpatriotic aspect."


