Next Conference at McConnellsburg.

At the Cumberland Valley Conference of the Lutheran Church held at Mechanicsburg on Monday and Tuesday of last week, seven vacant congregations were reported: Shippensburg, Fayetteville, Mercersburg, Trindle Spring, Greencastle, Newville and Boiling Springs. Strong stands were taken for the prosecution of the war and for a vigorous campaign for the election of dry candidates for the State legislature. The next conference will be held at McConnellsburg. The last time the Conference was held at McConnellsburg is about 25 years ago. Conference in the Lutheran Church is what Presbytery is to the Presbyterian, Classis to the Reformed or Conference to the Methodist.

The Cumberland Valley Conference of the Lutheran Church, of which the McConnellsburg charge is a part, is composed of 81 charges, 36 ministers and 50 congregations. The conference in McConnellsburg should bring into our town about 65 or 70 ministers and laymen.
