BOARD OF GAME COMMISSIONERS.

Notice is hereby given that it is illegal to kill a RUFFED GROUSE, commonly called Pheasant or a RINGNECK PHEASANT, or a VIRGINIA or HUNGARIAN QUAIL, in a wild state, in the County of Fulton before the open season of 1919, said County having been closed until that time by the Board of Game Commissioners to the hunting of these birds under the provisions and regulations provided for by the act of April 6th, 1915, Pamphlet Laws 73.

The Penalty for killing a Ruffed Grouse or a Ring-neck Pheasant or a Virginia or Hungarian Quail contrary to the above act and said regulations is \$25.00.

This notice has been taken in an endeavor to increase the above-mentioned game in your County, and we ask that you not only obey this law yourself, but that you help in every way possible to have said law obeyed by others.
