Easy Way to Pick Ducks.

"There is probably no more Fred Ikeler, disagreeable task about the farm than that of picking ducks," says Mrs. Eugene G. Benn, farm adviser of the Ponusylvania Department of Agriculture. "And likew'se there is hardly a more delicious dish to set before the king than roast duck. There would probably be many more ducks raised and caten if it were not for the difficulty of picking them.

'After the duck has been killed rub into the skin fine powdered rosin until the roots of the feathers are well covered with it. Then scald and the picking wash and cleanse thoroughly,

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION NO. 1.

Lieutenant Governor

(Vote for one)

Shall Section Four of Article Nine of the Constitution be Amended so as to read as follows?

Section 4. No debt shall be c eated by or on behalf of the State, except to supply casual d ficiencies of revenue, repel lavasion, suppress insurection, defend the State in war, or to pay existing debt; and the debt created to supply deficiencies in revenue shall never exceed in the aggregate, at any one time, one million dollars: Provided, however, Assembly, irrespective of any debt, may authorize the State to issue bonds to the amount of fifty millions of dollars for the purpose of improving and rebuilding the highways of the Commonwealth.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE

CONSTITUTION NO. 2.

Shall Section Eight of Article Nine of the Constitution be Amended so as to read as follows?

Section 8 The debt of any county, city, borough, township, school district, or other manicipality or incorporated district, except as provided herein, and in section fifteen of this article, shall never exceed seven (7) per centum upon the assessed value of the taxable property therein, but the debt of the city of Philadelphia may be increased in such amount that the total city debt of said city shall not exceed ten per centum [10] upon the assessed value of the taxable property therein, nor shall any such municipality or district incur any new debt, or increase its dness to an amount exceeding two (2) per centum upon such assessed aluation of property without the consent of the electors thereof at a pubhe election i such manner as shall be provided by In ascertaining the borrowing capacity of the sai deity of rhiladelphia, at any time, there shail be excluded from the calculation and deducted from such debt so much of the debt of said city as shall have been incurred, and the proceeds thereof invested in any public improvement of any character which shall be yielding to the said city an annual current net The amount of such deduction shall be ascertained by capitalizing the annual nes revenue from such improvements during the year immediately preceding the time of such ascertainment and such capitalization shall be estimated by ascertain ing the principal amount which would yield such annual, current net revenue, at the average rate of interest, and sinking fund charges payable upon the indebtedness incurred by said city for such tur-poses, up to the time of such ascertainment. The method of determi in; such amount, so to be de-ducted, may be prescribed by the General Assembly.

In incurring indebtedness for any purpose the city of Philadelphia may issue its obligations maturing not later than fifty (50) years from the date thereof, with provision for a sinking-fund sufficient to retire said ob igations at maturity, the payment to such sinking fund to be in equal or graded annual or other periodical instalments. Where any indebtedness shall be or shall have been incorred by said city of Philadephia for the purpose of the construction or improvements of public works of any character, from which income or revenue is to be derived by gain city, or for the recta nation of land to be used in the construction of wharves or docks owned or to be owned by said city, such obligation may be in an amount sufficient to provide for, and may include the amount of the interest and linking-fund charges accruing and which may accrue thereon throughout the period of construction, and until the expiration of one year after the completion of the work for which said indebtedness shall have been incurred; and said city shall not be required to levy a tax to pay said interest and sinking-fund charges as required by section ten, article nine of the Constitution of l'enusylvania, until the expiration of said period of one year after the completion of said work.




