WHEREAS, in and by the acts of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, passed the 17th day of June, Anno Domini, 1893, and the 27th day of June, Anno Domini, 1895, respectively, it is made the duty of the Sheriff of every county within the Commonwealth to give public notice of the General Elections and in such notices to enumerate the officers to be elected and give a list of all the nominations made, and designate the place at which the election is to be held. If you desire to vote for a person whose name is not on the ballot, write or paste his name in the blank space provided for that purpose. A cross (X) in the party square in the first column does not carry a vote for any Judge. To vote for Judge mark a cross (X) opposite the name of the candidate desired.
