The Republican National Convention in session at Chicago this week has not yet succeeded in making a nomination for President. The two days have been spent in skirmishing. James G. Blaine is still the favorite candidate, though he suffered a temporary defeat in the election of chairman, which was the first measurement of his strength. The field was combined against him, and his candidate for chairman, Gen. Clayton was defeated by ex-congressman Lynch, colored, of Mississippi by 44 majority in a total vote of 818. Minutes of the Snyder County S. S. Convention. SELMSGROVE, PA., May 20, 1884. The 14th Annual Convention of the Snyder County Sunday School Association convened in the Evangelical Lutheran Church on Tuesday evening May 20th, at 7:30, P. M. After singing and prayer by Rev. T. O. Cleese, President, pro tem, the first topic, "How shall we make this Convention a success," was taken up. Opened by Rev. Yutzky, followed by Rev. Cleese. Second topic opened by A. M. Carpenter, followed by Rev. Cleese and Rev. Haas. Doxology; benediction. May 21. Convention opened at 9 o'clock with Pres. Cleese in chair. After devotional exercises the Convention proceeded to the reception of delegates with satisfactory results. On Motion of A. M. Carpenter, Messrs J. C. Schoch, Rev. Haas, Wm. N. Heimbach, were appointed a committee to nominate officers to serve for the ensuing year. Com. reported, Pres. Rev. Yutzky, Recording Sec J. C. Schoch, Cor. Sec. Mrs. F. E. Bower, Treas. A. M. Carey. Received. 1st topic: What reform seems necessary in Sunday School work, was taken up. Opened by Rev. Cleese. Opener limited to 15 minutes, others 8 minutes. Topic: "Temperance and Sunday School," Rev. Cleese, followed by

Rev. Wampolo. Query box passed Adjourned. Afternoon Session opened with devotional exercises. Minutes read and approved. Treasurer, Hon. J. A. Smith rendered financial report which was approved. The Pres. appointed Revs. Haas and Cleese and A. M. Carpenter a committee on resolutions. Children's meeting addressed by Revs. Haas and Wampolo, followed by Cleese, Carpenter Smith. Topic, "Zelation of parents to S. S." Discussed by Wampolo, Cleese, Smith, Carpenter and Dr. Bora. Adjourned. Evening Session. Convention convened at 8 o'clock. Devotional exercises, minutes read and approved. Topic, "What is the relation of a pastor to the Sunday School of his church." Opened by Rev. Cleese, followed by Rev. Haas with a motion that this topic be dropped and the history of Sunday Schools in the county be taken up. Carried. Rev. Yutzky read a very interesting article on the subject, after which the next topic, "How shall the Sunday School protect itself against improper music and literature." Opened by Wm. Moyer. On Motion of M. L. Wagoner the address of Rev. Yutzky on the Sunday School History of the County was incorporated in the minutes. The President appointed as Executive Committee, Carpenter, Haas and Carey. Adjourned. Tuesday Morning. Convention opened at 9 o'clock. Rev. Curran of Clearfield county and Mr. Lepley were elected advisory members of the Convention. The topic, "Is a normal class a necessity in our Sunday School work," was ably discussed. 2nd topic, "The Christian Sabbath—its peril and our duty," was next considered. The Convention then voted to hold the next convention at Middleburgh, to meet on the evening of the 3d Tuesday of May, 1885. A. M. Carey elected primaries and J. C. Schoch seconds, as delegates to the next State Convention. It was voted that \$10.00 be sent to the Treasury of the State Convention. On motion of A. M. Carey the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That all the Superintendents in the county are earnestly requested and expected to be present at the next County Convention, when they will be called upon to make a verbal report of their school. The committee on resolutions made their report which was adopted as a whole. Adjourned. Meeting of the Democratic County Convention. The Democratic County Convention met in the Court House at 1 P. M. on Monday, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the different county officers. The convention organized by electing F. E. Bower, Esq., President and Wm. H. Moyer and R. C. Fiss, Esq., as Secretaries. The list of Delegates was then called over showing a full representation. On motion Messrs. W. H. Moyer, Dr. J. J. Greenhoe, John C. Keitzer, John B. Renrich and John M. Dauberman, Esq., were appointed a committee on Resolutions. The President of the convention then announced that nominations for the various county officers then in order. T. J. Smith, Esq., of Middleburgh was nominated for Congress by acclamation, with power to select his own conferees. Hon. Simon P. Wolverton of Sunbury was nominated for State Senator, by acclamation with power to appoint his own conferees. J. G. Leshar, Esq., of Monroe township was nominated for Assembly by acclamation. Nominations for Sheriff being called for, Tobias E. Reitz of West Beaver and James P. Smith of Middleburgh placed in nomination. Mr. Smith immediately directed the withdrawal of his name, whereupon on motion, Mr. Reitz was nominated by acclamation. Moses Krebs of West Beaver was nominated for County Treasurer by acclamation. The following gentlemen were then placed in nomination for County Commissioners. Isaac Erdley of Penns, D. F. Kerstetter of Franklin, John A. Moyer of Chapman and Peter Klingler of Monroe. Messrs. Isaac Erdley and D. F. Kerstetter were declared the nominees, they having each received 19 votes to 16 for Moyer and 10 for Klingler. George Dauberman of Washington and G. W. Hornberger of Perry were nominated for County Auditor's by acclamation. I. Grier Barber M. D. of Middleburgh was nominated for County Coroner by acclamation.
