A WICKED LIE NAILED.

BELLEFONTE, Oct. 11.—The following circular has been issued by employees of the iron works at this place, of which General Beaver, the Republican candidate for Governor is one of the proprietors, setting forth that injustice has been done them, as members of the Knights of Labor, as well as to General Beaver, by the circulation of reports relative to the use of store orders.

"Bellefonte, Pa., Oct. 11, 1886.—To the Knights of Labor of Pennsylvania:—The undersigned members of L. A. 2433, Knights of Labor, Bellefonte, Pa., who are members of both political parties, who are also employees of the Bellefonte Iron and Nail Company, Limited, fearing that injustice may be done to ourselves as members of the above organization, and also to one of our employers, Gen. James A. Beaver, by reason of false and slanderous reports circulated against us and him, in reference to the alleged use of store orders at the above works, desire to make you acquainted with the following facts: We are Knights of Labor in good standing in the above-mentioned Assembly, and are also employees of Bellefonte Iron and Nail Company. All our relations with said company, of which General Beaver is chairman, have been of the most satisfactory character.

"Our wages have been and are the highest paid in the Eastern district. All questions touching our employment and wages have always been adjusted by amicable conference with General Beaver or other members of the company. It is a wicked and malicious falsehood that any employee of the company was ever offered or ever received store orders in payment for wages. The Hoyt coupon system, in use at the store, is the best system we know of, and is far superior to pass books. We are paid in cash on monthly pay days, and can draw cash at any time during the month. The coupon system is used only when we prefer dealing at the store, and that is entirely voluntary on our part. The system avoids keeping of accounts by the workmen. Our employers inaugurated the system at the suggestion and request of some of our workmen. They have always been willing to abolish it, if the employees had made the request. To any that this system bears any relation to the odious store order system is a falsehood and slander upon us as Knights of Labor, as well as upon General Beaver as an employer of labor. We earnestly desire that no injustice shall be done to ourselves, to General Beaver, or to the organization in which we proudly claim membership. We denounce

all reports put in circulation by politicians or others at variance with the above statement, as false and malicious. We appeal to the organization everywhere to accept our statement of the truth of this matter in preference to the unauthorized allegations of outsiders. All who seek the truth and have a right to know the truth, or desire to verify our statement, are requested to make inquiry of the above Assembly of which we are members. All others are requested to come to the works and examine for themselves as to the truth of this statement. We voluntarily make it in order that designing men may not prostitute our noble order for partisan or dishonest purposes, and that injustice to ourselves and injustice to an employer who has always stood by us and our best interests, may not be accomplished.

"We ask all our fellow-workmen to aid in the circulation of this letter and explanatory document, so that the truth may be widely known and understood. [Signed] DAVID HAINES, Master Workman, L. A. 2333, Bellefonte, Pa., and 30 workmen.

RETURN HIS PENSION.

Mr. CARROLL, III, Oct. 8.—Don R. Frazier, who served three years during the war, and was captured in October, 1864, and remained a prisoner until the close of the war, has just sent the following letter to the commissioner of pensions: Mr. CARROLL, III, Oct. 6, '86. Gen. J. C. Black, Washington, D. C. DEAR SIR: Herewith I return for cancellation pension certificate No. 192,501, issued July 9, '81, for \$2 per month. The sum was too paltry originally. I made an application for an increase, and last July was before a board of examiners. A few days ago I received an official notice from your bureau that the claim was "rejected." I decline to be a further pensioner on the pitiful bounty of a government that allows its soldiers to suffer the torments of the damned in Andersonville prison. I decline to allow any government to longer say that what I endured for it in that racking hell can be balanced for \$24 a year. I decline to allow a government to rate my present health and my months of starvation and exposure in Cahaba and Millen at Savannah, Blackbear and Andersonville, as a credit against my pension.

I therefore return my certificate and ask that my name be stricken from the pension roll of the United States government. Yours, truly, DON R. FRAZER, Late 92 Ill. M'd Inf.
