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Pay for Attending Institute.

By an act of the present Legislature; approved by Governor Beatty on the 13th day of April, 1887, all boards of school directors and boards of controllers are required to pay the teachers for their attendance at the county institute. By the act of 1885 the teachers are required to attend the institute, or at least are not permitted to teach, but there was no provision made for their pay. This defect is remedied by the act of the 13th of April. It concludes as follows: Compensation as herein authorized shall not be less than the per diem pay for actual teaching provided, that it shall not in any case exceed two dollars per diem, and shall be allowed and paid to the teachers in their respective districts for each day's attendance reported as aforesaid by the proper superintendents; and provided further, that a common school month shall consist of 20 days' actual teaching as now required by law.'
