Democratic candidate for Governor or Powell, of Ohio, has been making an attack on Governor Foraker. When Foraker gets through with Powell the latter will be anxiously inquiring whether the cyclone struck anybody else.

The lumberman of Wisconsin are having a hard time this season. It is estimated that over 500,000,000 feet of logs are hopelessly hung up, and in consequence many mills have been obliged to suspend operations.

It is highly important that the Republicans of Snyder county should organize early for effective work, not only because the positions at stake this year are of considerable value, but because a substantial triumph gives for the party prestige and clears the way for another even more brilliant in 1888.

The number of State elections which will be held this year is small. Governors will be chosen in Iowa, Maryland, Massachusetts and Ohio. Minor State officers will be chosen in New York and Pennsylvania, the election taking place in each State on November 8.

As cold weather approaches the heating of railway cars again becomes, if not a burning question, one in which the traveling public will take a warm interest. The fatal disasters of last winter should certainly not be repeated, but that they will not be is not yet assured.

The Folly of Side Issues

There are no side issues in this political contest. It is an open and square fight between Republicans and Democrats, and those who are not for us are against us. Side issues are almost invariably in the interest of the Democrats, no matter what name they bear or what principles they profess.

Many of these side issues or excrescences are instituted by the Democrats to weaken the opposition, and when they are not of their creation they send missionaries with their political bible (boodle) to convert their faith and vote them as their proselytes. In this way they have gathered in those odds and issues and placed them where they would do the most good for their party.

On all great and vital questions of the day, whatever may be their opinions, those parties offer them an opportunity to show their faith by works which may be effective, and if they are honest and earnest they will choose between them. There is no occasion for side issues.

The Anthracite Strike

It is evident from the dispatches from the anthracite coal region that a very serious strike has been inaugurated among the miners. Thirty collieries, employing 10,000 men are reported idle and more are likely to go out.

There is never anything lost on the part of employers or employed in showing a disposition to be conciliatory. The live-and-let-live principle can only be exemplified by a free discussion of points at issue. The refusal to listen to complaints or demands for higher wages on the part of employees is almost certain to enlist public sympathy on behalf of the latter, independent of the merits of the dispute.

The last report of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company shows what effort is being made to meet the enormous demand for freight and passenger cars. Some idea of the magnitude of the improvements which the company has been making this year may be had from the statement that of the \$8,000,000 received from the issue of new stock, \$1,300,000 has been set apart to be expended in the purchase of new locomotives and passenger cars alone.

cars have thus been provided. A new car trust for \$11,000,000 bearing 4 per cent interest was authorized, the trust being divided into ten series, designated by the letters of the alphabet, of \$1,000,000 each. Up to date over \$5,000,000 car trust certificates have been issued, and nearly one-half of series F is now exhausted.

Murderer McCabe Caught.

BONESHALL, September 13.—James P. McCabe, the murderer of Michael Riley, who escaped from the Wayne County Jail the 18th of May last, was this morning captured in a barn in Preston township, about three miles from the scene of the tragedy, which was committed in December, 1885.
