In Northumberland County the Republicans elected their entire ticket excepting the Prothonotary.

The State Board of Agriculture will convene at Lewistown on the 7th of December.

The surviving members of Company D, 12th Pennsylvania Reserves, will hold a reunion in Harrisburg, December 3, 1887.

About a dozen of our sportsmen including the editor of the Post, left on Monday for—mountain, for a two week's hunt.

Winter weather prophets are getting in their customary work. As far as heard from, a mild winter is predicted. Hope it may be a true forecast.

Sunbury had a fire on the evening of election day, which destroyed property to the value of about \$9,000.

Ira T. Clement's loss is about \$3,000 with no insurance.

The dedication of the Lutheran Church at McClure has been changed from Nov. 29 to Dec. 4, a program of which will be published in our next issue.

H. E. Gutelius, brother of our townsman L. G. C. Gutelius, was elected Register and Recorder of Union county at the late election, by a majority of 850, leading the state ticket by 125 majority.

John Gilbert of Adamsburg, had his hand badly burned in attempting to remove a charge of powder in the mines in which he was working. The drill coming in contact with the rocks fired the powder.

Joseph Carstetter, of Raceoon Valley, Perry county, has lost over \$300 worth of hogs by the cholera, and several more of his porkers are suffering with the disease.

Wm. Florie of Perry county, while out hunting recently had his legs filled with shot through the carelessness of a companion's shooting. When hunting, parties can not be too careful in the handling of their guns.

In Juniata county the Republicans elected the whole county ticket. On the State ticket the Democratic majority was cut down to 30. The county officers elected are Prothonotary, Treasurer, Commissioners, District Attorney and Auditors.

The Bloomfield Times says some persons in that town are poisoning the dogs. Five have already been killed, the last one being a dog owned by the editor of the Times. In speaking of the matter he says: "If the mean cuss who poisoned him will take a dose of his own medicine, the town will be a gainer."

Look out for the silk card-case swindler. Don't give him any money to buy the silk, but tell him you will wait until he delivers the "case." He is a hard "case" and the Altoona people were duped out of some \$250 in one day. Give him the grand bounce when he comes.

On Sunday evening, Nov. 13, the pastor of the U. B. Church presented that congregation a beautiful collection set. The set consists of two cups and a stand, handsomely trimmed with plush. The work was tastefully and skillfully executed by Samuel Spitzer.

Saturday evening a son of W. H. Ripka rode a colt from his home to Globe Mills, dismounting he secured the animal to a post, and entered the store, when the colt broke the strap and started off. After an all night search he was found next morning in a corn field near Ripka's home.

Lewisburg people are making an effort to secure electric light for their town. If electricity will have the effect of brightening up some of the seven-century style of the old burg it should light up at once.—Sunbury Democrat.

Northumberland county, among other things in the way of improvement on his farm, has lately planted 250 apple trees, 300 pear trees, 4,000 peach trees, 900 quince trees, 4,000 raspberry plants, 2,000 currants and 5,000 strawberry plants.

The Pennsylvania company has been experimenting in the Altoona shops with the innumerable devices for heating cars by means other than the deadly stove. The best plan so far tested is for the use of steam supplied by the locomotive, and it is not unlike that now in use on some of the roads running out of Boston.

The election returns were computed on Wednesday last by Register Duck, Sheriff Middleburgh and Commissioners Mohr and Erdley. Judge Wetzel being a candidate and Judge Smith being unable to sit alone, the law in such cases provides that the returns be computed by the above named officers.

The Bedford Gazette says that last winter diptheria attacked a family in Monroe township, that county. The heavier covers used on the patients' beds were not washed or fumigated after the disappearance of the disease. In the spring these covers were packed away, and a few weeks ago these covers were taken out and put on the beds. There are now three cases of diptheria in that family, and there are no other cases in the neighborhood. And yet some people say that diptheria is not contagious.

The lecture will be free to all. Rev. Leshler returned from his second trip to the continent of Africa in July of this year. He also traveled extensively through Germany. A remarkable case is reported from Pavilion township, Kalamazoo county Mich. Robert Broekie, a farmer, had his neck dislocated by a tumble from a load of cornstalks Saturday afternoon. Dr. Braden, of Scotts, reduced the dislocation, and Mr. Broekie lives. Of course he isn't as chipper as a schoolboy, a large portion of his body being paralyzed, but the fact that he lives at all may be considered one of the wonders of 1887.

An old woodman says: "When I am in the woods I never use a compass; in fact I don't need any. There are three sure ways that I have for finding the points of the compass. You will notice that three-fourths of the moss on trees grows on the north side; the heaviest boughs on spruce trees are always on the south side; and thirdly, the topmost twig of every unjured hemlock tips to the east. You just remember those things and you'll never get lost."

Michael DuPyrre, conductor on the Lewisburg & Tyrone Railroad, was killed near Swengle station on Saturday night. He was assisting in shifting cars and had occasion to use the pushing pole. Not being able to find it he picked up a plank that was laying near by and used that. The full force had hardly been put on it when it broke and a piece struck him in the stomach causing internal injuries that resulted in death. He was the first man ever killed on the Lewisburg and Tyrone Branch.

WHERE DO THE BUGS COME FROM.—An intelligent gentleman remarked to us the other day that, with the object of experimenting, he took three potatoes and planted them in his backyard in Philadelphia, where a potato had never been grown. When they sprouted and threw up vines a foot in length, he found the vines literally covered with potato bugs. Where did they come from? His theory is, that the mother bugs had deposited their eggs on the potatoes. If this be so, it seems to us that before planting potatoes they might be subjected to some process that would destroy the eggs without injuring the potatoes. The subject is one of immense importance to farmers, and should be investigated.
