It provides that soldiers and sa ors who have served three mont and since become disabled from any canse, except by disreputable conduct of vicious babits, if dependent on their own labor for support, shall receive a pension according to such disability, not to exceed \$24 a month. The widow of an invalid pensioner who dies shall receive \$12 a month without being required to prove that death resulted from injuries received in the service. A widow's pension on account of minor children is to continue without limit if the child is of unsound mind or physically helpless; in case she marries, dies or abandons the children the pensions continues to them. Dependent parents; in order to receive \$12 a month, need only prove that they are without present means of comfortable support, save by their own annual labor or by charity. It also amends the Arrears of Pensions act to make pensions begin from date of death or discharge or disability subsequent to discharge.
