Hon. J. Q. Stewart, Deputy Superintendent of Public Instruction, replying to a question concerning the pay of teachers for institute week, gave a positive interpretation of the new law yesterday. He said that the act of Assembly, approved April 13, 1887, expressly requires the Boards of Directors to pay the teachers for the time of institute attendance as reported officially by the proper County Superintendent. Teachers are entitled to compensation for institute attendance in addition to their regular wages, according to their per diem pay for actual teaching, but compensation cannot lawfully exceed two dollars a day. The time of attendance cannot be credited as part of the twenty days actual teaching required to constitute a school month, but is in addition thereto.—Gambler Herald.

AS ACT—To abolish all taxes laid upon watches, household furniture and pleasure carriages within this Commonwealth, for State purposes.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted &c., that all taxes for whatsoever purpose, laid upon watches, household furniture and pleasure carriages, by and under the revenue laws of this Commonwealth, be and the same are hereby abolished, and the laws under which said taxes are levied and collected, so far as they relate to the property herein mentioned, are hereby repealed.

Approved: The 18th day of May A. D. 1887.

It is very probable that the scalp law which was repealed in the last Pennsylvania legislature will be restored in part. It seems to be the desire on every hand to have at least a premium on fox scalps, and it may be that others of the most destructive animals and birds will be included in the bill. Hon. A. S. Helfrich, who will have no opposition for the nomination and very little in his election to the legislature has promised us to do his utmost to have a bill to that effect brought up and considered favorably, and there will be members from other counties who will do the same. We hope they will be successful.

At a meeting of the Pennsylvania Fish Commissioners at Harrisburg on the 14th, it was decided to buy carp fry in sufficient quantities to meet the large demand for these fish. It was also resolved not to furnish more than two thousand trout to each applicant. The secretary was instructed to correspond with the hatching houses and ascertain the number of trout on hand, with a view to a pro rata distribution. A resolution was adopted directing the secretary to request market masters and others to see that no fish are sold out of season. Persons catching trout less than six inches long will be prosecuted and will be waged on fishbaskets. The commission will visit Allentown shortly to inspect the hatchery at that point.

Brother Lumbard of the Selinsgrove Tribune came within an ace of being killed on the railroad at Selinsgrove Junction a few days ago. He was standing on the west track intently watching a coal oil train going on the east track. His reverie was broken by the sharp whistle of a freight engine which came fanning down the track on which he stood and had approached him within eight feet when discovered. He leaped to one side just in time to escape the monster which went thundering down the track. Several eye witnesses thought he had been struck, but, though scared speechless for the time, he escaped injury, and is still with us to caution others against carelessness while walking on railroad tracks.

The Lewistown Gazette gives Judge Bucher particular fits for granting the usual number of licenses in Mifflin county this year. We can hardly see the justice in the attack. We know personally and positively that Judge Bucher is not in sympathy with the rum element, either in sentiment or action. The stand he recently took in a case under him in this county will justify this assertion. It is as much his duty to grant license as it is to sentence men to hang, and experience has taught all that he takes no pleasure in either. It is his duty to see that the laws are executed as laid down in the statutes, and not to make new ones. Personal desires or public prejudices should not bias his judgment, and any one asking it is not only very inconsistent but extremely impertinent.
