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

Private examinations will be given only in accordance with the school laws.

Applicants must be examined in the district in which they intend to teach. Persons who make No. I in any branch will be exempt from examination in that branch next year. This year I mark from 1 to 5. Teachers who barely passed last year should have made notable improvements. Birectors:—The certificate is to a certain extent a criterion of the leacher's worth. Applicants who have an average of 2½ to 2½ must be employed at the risk of the school board, which employs such applicants. Aside from the certificate, directors would do well in noticing points such as these; character, business qualifications, industry, habits, nature of the school, &c. Teachers should be selected on merit. It is expected that directors will attend the examinations. All triends of education are invited.
