Changes in Law Wanted.

The State Convention of County Commissioners met at Erie Wednesday Sept. 12. The report of the committee on resolutions was presented by S. Q. Woodcock of Blair, and J. G. Lloyd of Cambria, who were made permanent secretaries. The resolutions passed recommendations for enactment by the Legislature as follows:

To allow no rebates on penalties in the collections of county taxes. That the revenue bill which the Speaker of the Senate neglected to sign last year be re-enacted. That counties be classified as cities now are. That the office of district attorney be salaried. That constables make their quarterly returns to court through the nearest magistrate. That in commonwealth cases costs be paid only where the grand jury so directs. To permit tax collector to collect by distraint in any part of the country. To authorize the collector to collect by distraint at any time after receiving the duplicate. That every ward, borough or township shall elect assessors triennially, extending the time until January 1 for making returns to the Revenue Commissioners. That all tax as on unseated lands be made payable before August 10, and that there be a lien on timber in tree or stick and bark. That unseated lands be sold every two years instead of every five years. That there be no distinction in advertising between seated and unseated lands when sold for taxes. To tax all personal property of corporations, water transportation, canal, pipe line, telegraph and telephone companies, products of mines and oil wells, farm and shops, sheep, cattle and horses watches, etc. That the State tax of three mills be levied on securities owned by corporations as well as on those owned by individuals, and that one-half of the next avails of this three mill tax be diverted into the county treasuries. Repeal the mercantile tax, the tonnage tax, the tax on capital stock and all other taxes payable by corporations of the State under existing laws excepting the taxes on banks and bankers. To collect a State tax on rolling stock of railroad companies. To repeal that section of the Brooks act requiring constables to visit places where liquor is sold. To reimburse counties for expense of making assessed and copies of mortgages and judgments. To repeal act making road bridges a charge upon the county. To repeal the act providing for payment of alderman's costs in cases in which the defendants are discharged.

The Patrons of Husbandry of Pennsylvania were invited to cooperate with the national committee of thirteen to be appointed by the Chair for presenting the work of the

Convention to the Legislature. Allentown was selected for the next place of meeting in 1889. The commissioners decided to have their respective counties pay the expenses of their delegates.

Statesmanship.

In comparing the great men of our country who have taken prominent part in framing our constitution and laws of government with those of other countries America will certainly not suffer in the comparison, but can produce as efficient and able statesmen as any other country. This is almost a marvel, for in the early history of our country we were laboring under great disadvantages.—Our population was not by any means of one nationality, institutions of learning were scarce compared with other older established governments, we had no experience to fall back on, but our statesmen had to be chosen in a large degree from among the men who were following their daily avocations of mechanics and farmers. It was a great jump, for the woodman to be called on to lay down his axe, and the farmer to leave his plough, in order to legislate for his fellow citizens, and the resources they had to fall back on was only sound common sense and the incentive to protect their homes and families. This leads us then to notice that a man may have learning and experience but if he is not possessed of good common sense and sound judgment he is not what can be termed a good statesman. A legislator has the great difficulty on hand of framing such laws as shall benefit all classes of society and at the same time injure none. He must introduce new laws and frame new ideas in such a manner as not perceptibly to interfere with old established customs so as to make too radical a change, and right here is where his common sense must be applied. This has always been the great drawback to the French nation, their statesmen have always been lacking in the tact of legislating by degrees and educating the masses up to reform and entertain different views in governmental affairs by stages, but try and effect these changes by one sweep. They try to jump from the most absolute and exacting monarchy to the greatest extreme and liberal republic. They either carry their religious ideas almost to the extent of fanaticism or launch at one stroke into avowed infidelity. What has been the result of these radical changes? Generally carnage, anarchy, bloodshed and ruin. It takes very little sometimes to fall into an error and make a big mistake in framing a law; but it takes years of careful and judicious legislation to abolish an old-time custom in such a manner as to be acceptable to the masses, even if that custom is an acknowledged evil.

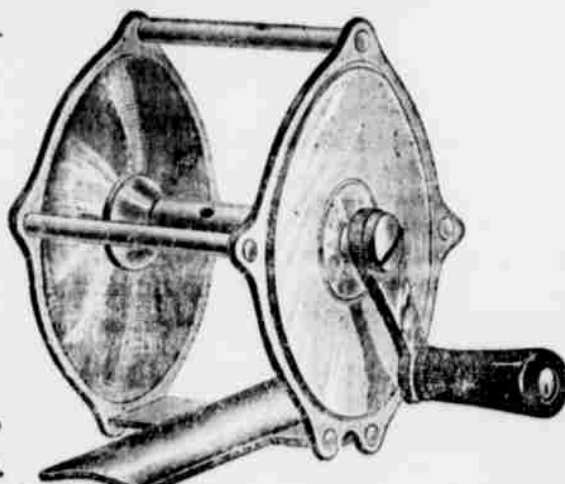
