Every person, excepting the Justices of the Peace and Aldermen, Notaries Public and persons in the civil service of the State, who shall hold or shall within two months have held any office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States, or of this State, and city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the Legislature, Executive or Judiciary Department of this State, or of any city or of any incorporated district, and also, that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and any officer or common council of any city or of any incorporated district, are by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector or Clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector, Judge, or other officer of said election, shall be eligible to be then voted for.
By the act of Assembly of July 3, 1880, it is also made the duty of every Mayor, Sheriff, Alderman, Justice of the Peace, Constable, of every city, county, township, or district, within this Commonwealth, whenever called upon by any officer of an election, or by three qualified electors, to clear any window or avenue to the window or avenue to the place

of General Election which shall be obstructed in such a way as to prevent voters from approaching the same, and it shall be the duty of every respective Constable of such ward, district or township within this Commonwealth, to be present or by Deputy, at the place of holding Elections, in such ward, district or township, for the purpose of preserving the peace of the same.
Also that in the 4th section of the act of Assembly entitled "An act relating to elections and their purposes," approved April 10, 1860, it is enacted that the Constable of each ward, district or township, shall not be construed as to prevent any militia officer or borough officer from serving as Judge, Inspector or Clerk of all County or special elections in this Commonwealth.
By an Act of Assembly approved the 17th day of April, 1869, it is enacted that at all elections hereafter held under the laws of this Commonwealth, the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock a. m. and closed at seven o'clock p. m. of this day.

The Inspectors and Judge of the elections shall meet at the respective places appointed for holding the election in the district to which they respectively belong, before seven o'clock in the morning, and each of those Inspectors shall appoint one clerk who shall be a qualified voter of the same.
The qualified voters of this county at all general, township, borough and special elections, are hereby authorized and requested to vote by tickets printed or written, or partly printed and partly written, or classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all judges, clerks, justices, and notaries to be elected outside of Judiciary, and shall embrace the names of all State officers voted for, and be labelled "State"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all County officers voted for, including office of Senator, member and members of Assembly if voted for, and be labelled "County"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all borough officers voted for, and be labelled "Borough"; and each class shall be deposited in separate ballot boxes.

Section 2. The right of citizens of the United States, to vote in the district or ward, as bridged by the United States, or by the account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude."
The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.
Section 3. The Congress of the United States, on the 31st of March, 1870, passed an act, entitled "An Act to enforce the right of citizens of the United States to vote in the several States of this Union, and for other purposes," the first and second sections of which are as follows:
Section 1. He is entitled by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that all citizens of the United States, who are, or shall be, entitled to vote at any election by the people, in any State, territory, district, county, city, parish, township, school district, municipality or other territorial subdivision, shall be entitled and allowed to vote at all such elections without distinction of race, color, or previous condition of servitude: and any law, statute, ordinance, regulation or any State or Territory, or any regulation of any State or Territory, or any regulation of its authority, to the contrary notwithstanding.
Section 2. And be it further enacted, That if by or under the authority, or the Constitution or laws of any State, or the laws of any Territory, any act, law, regulation, ordinance, or by such constitution or law, persons or officers are or shall be charged with the performance of any duty, or to citizens an opportunity to perform such duty, or to become qualified to vote, it shall be the duty of every such person and officer to give to all citizens of the United States, the same and equal opportunity to perform such duty, or to become qualified to vote without distinction of race, color, or previous condition of servitude; and if any such person or officer shall refuse or knowingly omit to give full effect to this section he shall, for every such refusal, forfeit and pay the sum of one hundred dollars to the person aggrieved thereby, to be recovered by an action on the case, with full costs and such allowance for counsel fees as the court shall direct, and shall also, for every such offence, be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall on conviction thereof, be fined not less than one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned not less than one month, or both more than one year, or both, at the discretion of the court.

And WHEREAS, It is declared by the second section of the VI article of the Constitution of the United States that "This Constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be the supreme law of the land, shall be binding on the Constitution or laws of any State to the contrary notwithstanding."
And WHEREAS, The Legislature of this Commonwealth, on the 6th day of April, A. D. 1870, passed an act, entitled "A further supplement to the act relating to elections in this Commonwealth," the tenth section of which provides as follows:
Section 10. That so much of every act of Assembly as provides that only white freemen shall be entitled to vote, or be registered as voters, or as claiming to vote at any general or special election of this Commonwealth, be and the same be null and void, and that hereafter all freemen, without distinction of color, shall be enrolled and registered according to the provisions of the first section of the act approved the 10th day of April, 1870, and the further supplement to the act relating to the elections of this Commonwealth, and when otherwise qualified under existing laws, be entitled to vote at general and special elections in this Commonwealth.
The said above recited amendment and acts must be executed, obeyed, by all assessors, register of voters, election officers, and constables, that the rights and privileges guaranteed thereby may be secured to all the citizens of this Commonwealth, and to the same effect.
By the 15th section of the act of Assembly of January 29, 1874, it is enacted that as soon as the polls shall close, the officers of election shall proceed to count all the votes cast for each candidate voted for, and make a full return of the same in triplicate, with a return sheet in addition, in all such cases the votes received by each candidate shall be given after his name, first in words and again in figures, and shall be signed by all of said officers and certified by overseers, or if not so certified, they shall be signed by their respective officers, or by the return sheet of their returns for not signing or certifying same. The votes as soon as received, shall be publicly and fully declared from the window to the citizens present, and a brief statement showing the voters received, by each candidate shall be made and signed by the other officers, as soon as the vote is counted, and the same shall be immediately posted upon the door of the election house for the inspection of the public. The triplicate returns shall be enclosed in envelopes and be sealed in presence of the officers, and one envelope with the unsealed return sheet given to the judge, and the other with the list of voters, tally-paper and oaths of officers and one of said envelopes shall be given to the other judges, and the return sheet with the list of voters, tally-paper and oaths of officers, shall be given to the Prothonotary of the Court of Common Pleas of the county which said return sheet shall be filed, and returned, with the return sheet, and the hour of the filing of the returns, and shall be preserved by the Prothonotary for public inspection. At twelve o'clock on the said second day following any election of the Court of Common Pleas of the County shall present the said returns to the Court.

Whenever a place of any city, county, township, or borough, for the safe-keeping of the ballot boxes, or for the election of judges, or for the election of a lot-box or boxes, or for the election of votes, and other papers, have been secured by bond with tape and sealed, and the signature of the judge and inspectors affixed thereto, and the same, together with the remaining boxes to the Mayor and Recorder of such city or in counties, townships, or boroughs to such person or persons as may be designated in the Pleas of that proper county of Commonwealth at the place provided, as aforesaid, who shall then deposit the said boxes and keep the same until the call of the court or any court or court authorized to try the merits of such election.
