Of the two hundred and four members of the Pennsylvania Legislature, for the year 1889, the Republicans will have 141, the Democrats 58, and the doubtful men number 5. The Republicans will control both branches.

The murder of Christopher Deering and his family at their farm, in the Neck, twenty-two years ago, by Anton Probst, has just been recalled by an effort to gain possession of 100 acres of real estate in the Twenty-eighth ward which will probably soon be made. This section, it is said, was purchased twenty-five years ago by Christopher Deering and his son William Deering, the only member of the family who survived the slaughter, will now try to procure title to it. The New Administration

The result of the late election will make a radical change in the lawmakers and chief executive officers of the Government, and from present appearances it looks as though the people of this country saw fit to place the control of our affairs entirely in the hands of the Republican party. But if the new administration supposes for one instant that they are to have an easy time of it and no work to do, they are sadly mistaken. As our population increases and our Government develops itself, the responsibility becomes more weighty, our needs more numerous, and the interests of our citizens, not as a party or faction, but as a whole class, demand more attention, and the party who attempts to shirk these responsibilities, and pays no attention to the needs or study the interests of our country from North to South and East to West, will soon be thrown over-board and another class of individuals selected to fill their places; consequently when the 51st Congress assembles great national questions will confront them and demand their immediate attention.

In the first place comes tariff reform in some shape or other. The people were evidently not satisfied with the construction of the Mill's bill, and to leave matters stand as they are will cause a more general and widespread dissatisfaction. The Republican party is pledged to provide a remedy and the people will look for it. Again, the immigration question is assuming serious proportions, not the Chinese alone, but also the pauper labor of Europe apparently requires some restricting power in order that our own labor circles may not be impoverished.

If, as asserted by Mr. Blaine, trusts are private concerns and no administrative power is responsible for them, and the only way to reach them is by a direct law, then the sooner we have such a law the better it will be for the community at large; and let this law be so direct that it will pluck out root and branch this bugbear of American industries and trade.

Probably three or four Western territories will knock peremptorily at the door of the 51st Congress and ask permission to enter our Union as States. The people will watch with a jealous eye under what condition they will be received if admitted, or what are the reasons if excluded. There must be no abuse of party power for party reasons in this matter one way or the other. If they possess the necessary qualifications to become States, they must be admitted; if not, they ought to be refused.

These are only a few of the many weighty questions that will confront the next Administrations, and the eyes of every American voter will be open to see how it disposes of them.

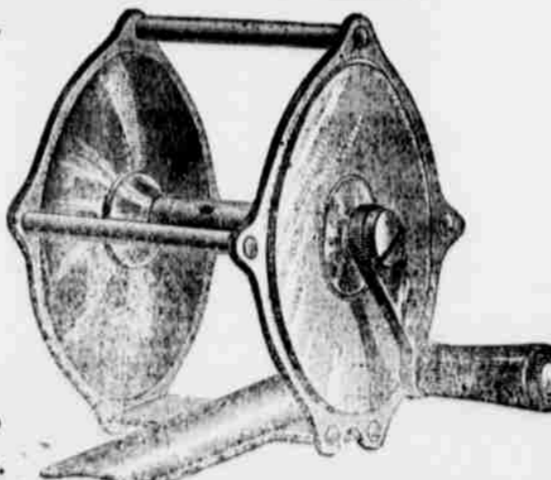
