It cannot be a failure on the whole unless all family life shall prove to be a fail-

Marriage without housekeeping is a hybrid of modern invention, which is about equal to life without a home. It is true many married people board and claim to find pleasure therein, but that shows an abnormal taste which has grown up through lack of knowledge of anything better.

But, then, it cannot be denied that some wives are unfit to preside over a home. 
