The Grangers Pic-nic.

EXCURSION TICKETS TO CENTRE HALL, PA.

The Sixteenth Annual Pic-nic of the Patrons of Husbandry will be held in Fort Woods, Centre Hall, Pa., September 17th to 20th, 1889.

This gathering of the husbandmen from the interior of the state of Pennsylvania from present indications will be very large. The most prominent agriculturists will be present, together with men of prominence in all the callings of life and the interchange of idea, the display of machinery and products, renders the educational advantages, second only to the benefits of social intercourse.

For the benefit of visitors, the Pennsylvania R. R. Co. will sell Excursion tickets to Centre Hall, Pa., September 16 to 20 inclusive, good for return passage until September 21st, 1889 inclusive, from all principal stations from Harrisburg, Lock Haven, Bellefonte and intermediate station, and stations on Bald Eagle Valley Railroad from Tyrone to Lock Haven at single fare for the round trip.

Card Orders calling for the sale of Excursion tickets from other points in the state of Pennsylvania, not included in above, can be procured on application to Mr. Leonard Rhone, Chairman of Pic-nic, Centre Hall, Pa.

Special trains will be run between Bellefonte and Centre Hall, and between Sunbury and Centre Hall, September 17, 18, 19 and 20, at suitable hours for the accommodation of visitors.

Half Rates to Baltimore.

The most extensive and interesting exposition Maryland has ever known will be held in Baltimore, September 9th to 14th, 1889.

The programme of the exposition promises a great and diversified display of products and machinery, an extensive exhibition of live stock, races, and horse and cattle sales. Other features include an imposing industrial and civic parade, composed of two hundred floats and fifty thousand uniformed men, the celebration of North Point, and a representation of the bombardment of Fort Mchenry. The handsome new post-office will be dedicated with appropriate ceremonies, participated in by the President of the United States and his Cabinet.

For the benefit of visitors the Pennsylvania Railroad Company will sell excursion tickets to Baltimore, from September 7th to 14th, valid for return until September 21st, from all stations on its main line and branches, except the Schuylkill and Bedford Divisions, at a single fare for the round trip.

Half Rates to Gettysburg via Pennsylvania Railroad.

The encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic and the Veteran Association, and the dedication of State monuments, at Gettysburg in the early days of September, will be one of the most interesting occasions in the history of the famous field. An unusually large number of veteran warriors will be present, and the dedicatory ceremonies will be highly interesting to old soldiers and civilians alike.

September 11th and 12th will be Pennsylvania days, when all the State monuments will be dedicated.

For the benefit of visitors the Pennsylvania Railroad Company will sell excursion tickets from all principal stations in the State of Pennsylvania to Gettysburg, September 7th to 12th, valid for return until September 13th inclusive, at the rate of a single fare for the round trip.

Trusts.

The New York World makes the following timely comments, which a merchant in Sunbury hands us, and from which we clip extracts:

"It is not an easy matter to learn what profits are made by trusts. All that the public knows is that the men connected with this modern product of business life have become enormously rich, and that trusts have gone on and multiplied until they have become a power, the extent of which can hardly be estimated. The parent of all trusts—the Standard Oil—first took the position that it was purely a private affair, and other trusts have followed the example of secrecy thus set them.

"In our 'Statistical' of January 10, 1889, we gave the consumption of sugar in the United States in 1888 at 1,457,264 tons, the export 11,489 tons, together 1,468,753, of which amount we estimated that 1,362,253 tons

passed through the refineries of the United States, and 106,500 tons were consumed without refining. Of the 1,362,253 tons we estimated that 1,002,791 tons passed through refineries controlled by the Sugar Refineries Company, and 359,422 tons, or say 26.4 per cent, were refined by the independent refiners. We might have added that we estimated the net profit to the refiners at five-eighths cent per pound, or say \$14 per ton, which gave the Sugar Refineries Company \$14,000,000 profits and the outside refiners \$5,000,000 profit, which figures we have still no reason to change.

"The consumption of sugar in the United States from January 1 to June 1, was 680,097 tons, as above, of which amount we estimate that 630,000 tons passed through the refineries, and 50,000 tons consumed without refining. Of the 630,000 we estimate that 445,000 tons passed through the Sugar Refineries Company, and 185,000 tons, or 29.4 per cent., were refined by independent refiners.

We estimate the net refining profit at \$14 per ton, or say \$6,230,000 profit to the Sugar Refineries Company, and \$3,590,000 to others. Up to April 1st there was no special profit to refiners over the preceding year, from the advanced raw market, but for April and May melting such additional profit may safely be estimated at one-half cent per pound on 178,000 tons, or say \$2,000,000 for the Sugar Refineries Company, and on 74,000 tons, and say \$830,000 for the others. Say total net profit for the five months of \$8,230,000 for the Sugar Refineries Company, and \$3,410,000 for the outside refiners—say three in Philadelphia, (not including Mr. Claus Spreckle), one in Boston, and one in San Francisco.

"The Sugar Refineries Company have at the present time in stock here and at San Francisco and New Orleans, and secured for shipment, probably 150,000 tons of raw sugar, (we are told 180,000 tons,) the profit on which, (150,000,) owing to the rapid rise now in progress, may be safely averaged at one cent per pound net refining profit, or say \$4,775,000, which, added to the \$8,230,000 profit already secured, gives \$15,000,000 virtually in hand."—Sunbury News.
