ORDINANCE PASSED
September 23, 1889.

It is enacted that wherever cobbling is done, and hereafter ordered by Council, the owners of lots are required to furnish proper cobbling stones and to have them in front of their lots at their own expense, and the Council will cause the same to be laid down at a regular and uniform grade, and to be given, from time to time, to the surveyor, said cobbling stones are to be washed within 30 days from the publication of this ordinance. On motion it is hereby ordered that whenever necessary, and ordered by Council from time to time, each lot owner shall scrape and clean the street front and rubbish from curbing to the sidewalk, and immediately in front of his lot, and take or haul the same away or remove it, if not so done and taken away, a reasonable time set by the said Council may be taken, and the same may be ordered to be removed at the expense of this Borough, and the said Council may order this work to be done by the said Borough, and the same to be done by the said Borough, and the proceeds of which to be used for other borough funds are generally applied.
