

INAUGURATION.

Campbell Steps Into Foraker's Shoes as Governor of Ohio.

At 10 o'clock Monday morning Governor Campbell was escorted to the Neil by a committee of the Senate and House.

His inaugural address was comparative brief and touched upon a number of subjects of State and local interest.

He favors the abolition of the office of Commissioner of Railroads and Telegraphs, and thinks the duties could be better performed by a Railroad Commission.

A GENUINE BLIZZARD. Severe Storm Reported from Northwestern and Western Points.

Advices from St. Paul and Milwaukee are to the effect that the blizzard is general throughout the Northwest and that all trains in the Dakotas, Minnesota and Wisconsin are from one to four hours late.

The storm has been raging for 14 hours in St. Paul. Street car travel has been abandoned.

The storm was general throughout Wisconsin, and reports from Green Bay, Marquette, and other Northern Points are that the snow storm is still prevailing. The storm is very severe in Iowa.

CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE AND HOUSE.

The Speaker laid before the House a letter from the Secretary of the Treasury, recommending that the estimated appropriation of \$450,000 for the public building at San Francisco be made in a deficiency appropriation bill.

The House then went into Committee of the Whole (Mr. Burrows, of Michigan, in the chair), for the further consideration of the District of Columbia Appropriation bill.

In the Senate, Wednesday, after some routine business, Mr. Voorhees called up the resolution offered by him in relation to the alleged interference by Mr. Chambers, the U. S. District Attorney at Indianapolis, to prevent the arrest of W. W. Dudley, on a charge of violating the Election laws of Indiana and proceeded to address the Senate.

Senator Pinnb Monday introduced a bill revoking all leases with the Alaska Company, the leases to be assumed by the Government. The bill also requires the Secretary to promulgate regulations prohibiting the taking and killing of seals or other fur-bearing animals by any but natives, and prescribing the number to be taken each year.

Representative Stewart, of Vermont, introduced in the House a bill declaring that no woman shall be eligible to vote at any election or hold civil office in the Territories of the United States, or title upon any public lands. Voters are required to make oath that they do not belong to the Mormon Church as a preliminary to exercising the right of suffrage.

CHAMPAGNE AND WHISKEY.

The importations of champagne in 1886 were larger than they have ever been before, and this is attributed to the fact that sparkling wines have been adopted by the American people as their fashionable drink, and also to the fact that the champagnes now being shipped to this country are of a high grade, the importers having found that it no longer pays to offer the public poor and artificially prepared champagnes.

One hundred thousand barrels of domestic whiskey were received and presumably drunk in New York last year, and of Scotch and Irish whiskies 35,000 gallons came in wood and 10,000 in glass. Cordials are becoming fashionable, as there were over 41,000 cases imported last year, more than ever before, together with 17,800 packages of ginger ale and 117,377 packages of mineral waters, both of which showed an increase on previous years.
