

Charley Wolfe Speaks.

Hon. Chas. S. Wolfe, of Lewisburg, was last week interviewed by a Philadelphia Times reporter...

"No, I am not an aspirant for any office at the hands of the Prohibition or any other party. I have spent my last dollar and rendered my last hour's service to the people of Pennsylvania in a political way...

"I firmly believe that the present managers of the Republicans have made a bargain with the liquor dealers' organization to render nugatory the temperance legislation of the entire country...

"The responsibility and consequences of this sad condition of affairs, both politically and morally, rest upon the conscience and the shoulders of the Christian church. When I search bishops and bishops and doctors of divinity and pastors, and deacons and elders shirking their plain Christian duty by reason of blind and bigoted partisan spirit and violate the most sacred obligations of their Christian citizenship by standing in the way of and hindering reform, I wash my hands of all further responsibility. Principle has been subjugated to party, and now I am simply looking on watching the sequence of events..."

"The great body of the Christian church, I tell you, say, has not neutralized but nullified itself. John Wanamaker and other leading church members have joined Quay and his political imps, borrowing the liveliest of heaven to serve the devil in. This may sound like very harsh language, but it is the truth, the result of the attitude taken by professing Christian men on the great reformatory, moral and political questions of recent times."

"And if this state of affairs continues until after I am dead and buried in yonder cemetery I want one word carved on my tombstone, and that word is 'Deserted'—not 'Disappointed,' but 'Deserted'—so that, when the stranger pauses beside my resting place and inquires what it means, he shall be told that there lies a man who entered the political arena and when comparatively young gave the best of his time, talent and work to the great cause of honest reforms in their behalf, and that when he rose to a certain point, and had accomplished more than he or his friends had ever reasonably expected for the purifications of his party and the good of the people of the entire Commonwealth, he was 'deserted' by the people he had championed; he was 'deserted' by the friends he counted on standing by him in his battle for reform; he was 'deserted' by the Christian church and its members in his martyrdom for the right."

A Judge Forever Discharges a Jury Because of Their Verdict.

One of the most astonishing verdicts ever rendered by a Lackawanna jury was that last Thursday at Scranton, which declared Patrick Loftus not guilty of selling liquor without license, and putting the costs upon the county, despite the fact that Loftus himself on the witness stand swore that he had violated the law, and that the charge of Judge Connelly that the jury should find Loftus guilty if his testimony was to be believed.

The verdict was recorded by Judge Archbald, but when Judge Connelly,

who tried the case, heard of the verdict he went upon the bench and had the jurors summoned before him. The judge told them they were a disgrace to the intelligence of Lackawanna county, that their action made a farce of a court of justice, and to show the utter contempt in which the court held such a verdict, he would now publicly discharge them by discharging them from further service on this panel of jurors; also that their names be preserved, that the jury commissioners, and whatever judge would hereafter fill the jury wheel, might take notice that none of the twelve should hereafter be drawn as jurors in that county.
