Court Proceedings.

Court convened Monday, Feb. 23, 1891, at 11 o'clock a. m. Present Hon. J. C. Bucher, President Judge and Hon. S. A. Wetzel and Hon. Henry Brown Associate Judges, John Stetter, W. H. Napp, James Houser and Frederick Row were appointed Tipstaves.

QUARTER SESSIONS.

Commonwealth vs. Charles S. Reninger; Defendant was discharged under the insolvent laws.

The resignation of H. E. Schambach as constable of Franklin township was ordered to be marked filed by the court, and H. W. Felty was appointed in his stead.

In the case of the Commonwealth of Penn'a vs. Adam Comfort, the defendant was found guilty in manner and form as he stood indicted, and the court sentenced him on the 2nd count, to wit: aggravated assault and battery, to pay a fine of \$200.00, the costs of prosecution and undergo an imprisonment in the Eastern Penitentiary at hard labor for a period of three years.

In the case of the Commonwealth, vs. George Kawell, the defendant plead guilty to the charge of larceny, and the court sentenced him to pay a fine of \$1.00, costs of prosecution, to restore the stolen goods and undergo an imprisonment in the county jail for two months.
