Kline, of Port Ann, Uncle Rob, Middleswarth and the writer, returned from White Deer on Saturday with a fine "old fawn" which dressed the usual weight, and was shot by Centreville's veteran deer.

Another deer was wounded by Mr. Brouse but it escaped. Deer are not over plentiful and the foliage is too thick yet, which, together with dry weather, makes it bad for hunting at present. Another thing that makes hunting unpleasant at White Deer—the woods are full of poison.
