The historic Blennerhassett Island in the Ohio River is gradually being washed away, and lately the water has found a channel through the center, which is rapidly aiding the work of destruction. It will soon be thing of the past.

Perhaps no spot along the Ohio has such an interesting history as Blen-nerhassett's Island. Its lore is that, of the nation itself. It was here that Aaron Burr's treachery was practically checked, and the triumph of that event is mellowed by the sadness of the fall of poor old Blenner-bassett—the dupe of Burr. Over a pentury ago this gentleman settled on the island, building himself a delightful residence, and ever afterward dispensing most elegant hospitality. Here it was that Aaron Burr interested him in his scheme for seizing Mexico, where, in case of success, Burr was to be Emperor. Theodosia Alston, Burr's daughter, was to be empress, and Blennerhassett was to receive the title of Duke and appointment as Ambassador to England. Blennerhassett expended large sums in fitting out an expedition, and, though discouraged when he learned of Burr's real designs, the intriguer had such influence with Blennerhussett's wife that the old man still adpered to him. After becoming thorsuchly interested in Burr's visionary interprise. Blennerhassett took him over to the town of Marietta, Ohio, for the purpose of purchasing supplies for the voyage. Provisions were bought and orders given for building afteen boats. Further work was interrupted in December, 1806, by the militia, who, discovering Burr's plans took possession of the boats. The days following were lively times or Blennerhassett's Island. Burr and Blennerhassett both having to go neavily armed to protect themselves against suspicious citizens. When, ater on, they fled to Cincinnati and the South, Mrs. Biennerhassett showed her loyalty to her husband by sending her trustworth servant, Peter Taylor, after the old gentleman to bring him back. Blennerbassett was arrested in 1807

and held for trial as a traitor, but Burr's acquittal set all suspected people free. His beautiful island and home had been sacrified to creditors, and he west to Natchez a bankrupt. He undertook a cotton plantation. but the war with England ruined commerce and he then removed to Montreal, where he practiced law. In 1822 he went to Ireland, but here he failed to secure certain property, and contined to fail in every project he andertook In the last years of his ife he war supported by his sister, who had do a small estate to his wife and caldren.

A REVIEW OF TRADE.

This Shows the Best and Worst of Business-Wheat Lower Than Ever Before Other Lines Good.

R. G. Dun & Co. in their weekly review of trade say: There is a car famine from Pittsburg to the Rocky Mountains. This single fact shows the best and the worst of business. The West is marketing enormous crops, probably exceeding in quantity all official or unofficial estima'es, but Europe is buying only moderately, the demands of the East are not greater than usual and all the elevators both east and west are crammed with grain and the yards full of loaded

Wheat is selling at the lowest price ever known in New York, Many years ago it touched 76 in one day, but the quo ation is now 752 for October delivery,

now 75% for October delivery,

Receipts at western ports have been 6,300, 000 bushels in four days and more than 36, 000,000 bushels in four weeks, while the exports from Atlantic ports in four days have been 1,300,000 bushels. The price bere has declined 1%c, and the opinion steadily gains ground that all estimates of the crop have been below the truth. Corn has advanced 1&c and oats 1c. The belief is that the yield of corn, though larger than was recently expected, will not quite equal the year's demand. Oil has declined 3c, while coffee has risen \$c\$, but the price of cotton is the same as a week ago. At Boston money is slim and collections satisfactory. Woolen manufacturers are busy with prices unchanged and the shoe manufacturers are pressed with orders. At Philadelphia the iron trade improves. The demands for worsteds is satisfactory and carpet and knit goods works fairly employed.

goods works fairly employed.

A jump in prices of soft steel is seen at Pittsburg, but the glass trade is not in good condition. At Cincinnati whisky is strong the demand increasing and the medium of lower grades of tobbaco is strong. General trade is good at Cleveland, with rolled from in active demand. At Indianapolis trade is unusually good, and at Detroit active, with money in fair demand. The celebration at Chicago has reduced business; light receipts in corn, increased largely of wheat, 40 per cent of flour, cheese 20 per cent and of butter 7 per cent in comparison with last year.

ter 7 per cent in comparison with last year, but a decrease in oats, rye, barley, dressed beef, cattle and hogs. At Milwaukee trade is larger and at St. Paul good, though collections are only fair, but Minneapolis wheat receipts are 600,000 bushels.

The lumber trade is excellent. Business at St. Louis is strong, grain receipts being remarkably large at Kapsas City, receipts of cattle and hogs are heavy, though the car blockade checks transactions there. At Omaha trade is heavy in groceries, in dry Omaha trade is heavy in groceries, in dry goods and hardware, and at Denver good in all lines. At Little Rock the outlook i-gloomy abut at Louisville trade is satisfac-tory, and steady at Memphis, though below the normal. Business is fair at Nashvine-but somewhat quiet at New Orleans owing to labor troubles.

Though it is not the season for especial activity in boots and shoes it is stated that not for years has there been such a demand. The demand for paper is so large that price of line quality have risen 1 cent and book paper from ic to ic. Textile manufactures e busy as usual.

Exports of domestic products continue much below last year s in value as is natural, the decrease in New York for four weeks being 20 per cent. Imports continue remarkably large and treasury receipts scheavy that the stock of gold increased \$1,300,000 and of silver \$2,200,000, while \$7,700.

300,000 and of siver \$2,20,000, while \$7,000,000 more paper was put out. The stock mark et has been stronger, but speculation is still unsupported by any public demand.

The exposition will exert reasonable care in the protection of exhibits, but will not stand responsible for any loss or damage. No patent medicines or nos' trums whose ingredients are concealed will be accepted for exhibition. Catalogues will be printed in English, French and Spanish and will be published by the exposition exclusively.

Cholera has appeared in Winnitza, a town in Podelia, and owing to the lack of sanitary arrangements the disease is rapidly spreading. The inhabitants are panie stricken.
