The Republican Party.

How shallow is the idea that because the Republican party has suffered one of the greatest defeats in its history, it is on the eve of dissolution! There are men that prophesy that the Republican party will never present another Presidential candidate, but they are either very thoughtless or braggarts.

It is admitted on all sides that the absorbing question of the recent campaign was the tariff. Though other issues were at stake, this one great problem was enough to occupy the minds of the people. The Republican party stood by the protective principle and was beaten on that point and that alone.

The election was won by the Democrats not because they are united on a new tariff policy, but because elements in the Republican party were discredited with the McKinley law. The Republican party fought gallantly against the ideas of low tariff men on its own side, against the opposition of the solid South, against the enormous boss-controlled vote of the vicious and ignorant demagogue in the cities—where the Democratic victory was mostly won—against the friends of dishonest money and against the newly settled farmers of the great West, who had been taught to believe by the Democratic press that protected industries were getting rich at their expense.

The odds were too great for the Republican party or any political party to overcome in one campaign. We have seen the pendulum swing farther away from Republican success and it will surely come back again.

The reason is that the very strength of the Democratic party will eventually prove to be its weakness. The voters who gave it its great victory cannot be controlled under the Democratic organization. They represent too many different and diverse ideas.

The fiscal policy of the government is, of course, an important consideration always. But in a great and growing country like this other and more important subjects are still unsettled. They demand settlement by a party which is composed mostly largely of the brains and patriotism of the United States. The Democratic party is naturally unsound on the purity of the ballot. It favors sectional prejudice which for the time being enables it to retain votes which do not properly belong to it. The hostility of the protective system which is an inherent part of the makeup of the Democratic party, will retard the development of one great section of the country—the South. The South will eventually see with which party its interests lie and will no longer be "solid."

Glorious as its record in the past has been, the Republican party should not look to its future strength from that source alone, but should incorporate in its platform every real and sound need of the country. It should not truckle to the whims and passions of the ignorant. It must continue to be courageous in regard to its principles of a fair ballot and an honest count. It must always defend the American workman against the free coinage of silver. It must demand a stoppage of the importation of diseased and vicious foreign labor. It must continue to favor a system of liberal expenditure on great Government affairs, such as the building up of the navy, the development of a system of coast defenses, and the extension of our foreign trade.

The Republican party must yield a fair and reasonable place in its leadership, councils and candidates to younger and more active men and citizens of foreign birth. Its interior or organization must be perfected, its discipline increased, and its rank and file placed in a position to yield to their party their old-time enthusiasm and regard.

All these general principles can be

applied in just and specific measures as the time of the next and succeeding elections approach. Let no Republican be discouraged. The Republican party has cause for congratulation, both on the grand principles which it has made its own and also from the fact that its old enemy, the Democratic party, is not inherently a party of progress or reform, but, rather, has repeatedly proved itself ready to yield to the thoughtless hurrah of the multitude.

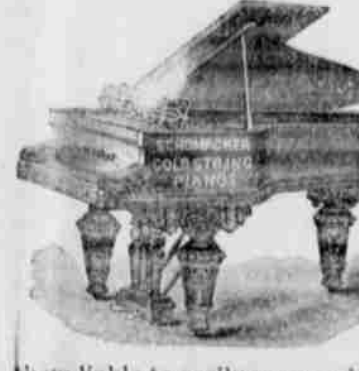
