Thursday, January 26, 1893. President Hayes's Title.

The death of ex-President Hayes has revived discussion of the incidents and turmoil between his election in November, 1876, and his inauguration on March 4, 1877.

In no other instance have the Presidential election returns from the several States been subjected to such close scrutiny and rigorous examination, and yet every tribunal legally organized or deputed to pass upon the title to office accorded it to Gov. Hayes.

As for the politics in it, no sane man holds that the Southern States are held together by any other means than force, fraud and the shotgun. It was so in the Hayes election; it is so to-day, and we fear that it is likely to continue so for years to come.

We do not doubt that several of the Southern States have voted for Republican Presidential candidates since then, and that others would have done so but for unlawful methods, but the territory south of Mason and Dixon's line is still a land of darkness.

Cleveland and Hayes.

New York Jan. 19.—Mr. Cleveland's departure to-day for Fremont, O., to attend the funeral of ex-President Hayes indicates publicly what his friends have known to be his estimation of the man, who, until within a day or two, was, except Mr. Cleveland, the only living ex-President.

Moreover, Mr. Cleveland has always regarded Hayes' administration as an unusually able one. The resumption of specie payments was a financial achievement about which Mr. Cleveland is always fond of talking to men who had some part in it, and he has said within a few weeks that the principal error in Mr. Hayes' administration, in his opinion, was his own veto of the refunding act in the winter of 1881.

Mr. Cleveland's attendance at Mr. Hayes' funeral is a serious interruption to plans which he has rather carefully laid out for the next six weeks, and it indicates how imperative a duty and how great a privilege he esteemed it to pay the last tribute of respect to one of his predecessors, that he should have been willing to give up half a week to this sad obligation.

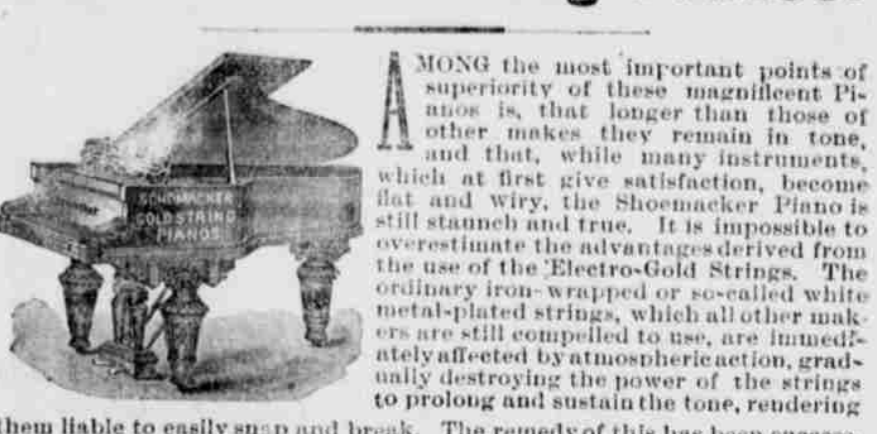
